Hours 5:30am—5:30pm 630-736-3741 hbradtke@streamwood.org Recently, some questions have been asked regarding E-Bikes in Illinois. In hopes of clarifying Illinois law (625 ILCS 5/11-1517), I've detailed some information below.

What's an E-bike?

- A bicycle equipped with fully operable pedals and an electric motor of less than 750 watts.
- E-bikes are classified into a three class system based on whether the motor assists only when pedaling and the top assisted speed.
 - Type 1: Max speed of 20 mph with pedal assist only, no throttle.
 - Type 2: Max speed of 20 mph with pedal assist and throttle, allowing the bike to drive itself.
 - Type 3: Max speed of 28 mph with pedal assist only, no throttle. Riders must be at least 16 years old. Requires speedometer.

Regulations?

- E-bikes are not allowed on sidewalks and must abide by the rules of the road when on the roadway.
- Mut be labeled with classification number, top assisted speed, and motor wattage.
- Must be equipped with a lamp at the front and a reflector at the back to operate at night similar to a bicycle.

Remember:

• Always wear a helmet, look both ways at intersections, and walk your bike in crowded areas.

Holiday tips

- Remain present in the house while the turkey/meal is cooking
- Make sure the food is cooked properly
- Keep children away from the stove, hot liquids, knives, etc.
- Make sure smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are working. Keep fresh batteries in them and test them often
- If traveling to a loved one's house, be mindful of the weatherand travel conditions
- Drink responsibly-use a ride share agency if need be
