Beat the Heat: Stay Safe This Summer!

- As temperatures rise, it's crucial to keep yourself and your loved ones safe from the heat. Follow these tips to stay cool and healthy:
- Stay Hydrated: Drink plenty of water throughout the day. Avoid sugary drinks and alcohol, as they can dehydrate you.

- Seek Shade: Limit direct sun exposure, especially during peak hours from 10 AM to 4 PM.

Authorities stress the importance of safe driving practices such as adhering to speed limits, avoiding distractions like texting or using phones while driving, and ensuring everyone in the vehicle wears seat belts. Additionally, heightened pedestrian and cyclist activity calls for increased awareness from drivers, who should be vigilant in sharing the road and yielding to vulnerable road users. Between Memorial Day and Labor Day, the period is commonly known as the 100 deadliest days of summer. During this time, data has indicated a sharp increase in fatal crashes, especially with teen drivers. The information below should be shared with your teen drivers, however it's a good reminder for us all.

- Distracted driving: Distraction plays a role in nearly six out of ten teen crashes. Cell phones are considered the second-biggest distraction to teen drivers. (The biggest distractions are teen passengers.) Set your phone to "Do Not Disturb" while driving.
- Driving with teen passengers. Research shows that the risk of a fatal crash increases in direct relation to the number of teenagers in a car. Having other passengers in the car can contribute to peer pressure and the impulse to engage in dangerous habits like speeding and aggressive driving.
- Speeding. Speeding is a factor in nearly 30 percent of fatal crashes involving teen drivers.
- Not wearing a safety belt. Teens who buckle up significantly reduce their risk of dying or being seriously injured in a crash. Click It Or Ticket.

Vehicles vs. Pedestrians

Motorists, please know that it is your responsibility to watch for pedestrians and bicyclists while driving in your vehicle.

We'd like everyone to know the lawful rules that exist regarding vehicle and pedestrian safety. Pedestrians also need to watch for vehicles. While this seems pretty basic there are people that aren't heeding this advice and are involved in motor vehicle crashes with pedestrians. While many of us have been told that pedestrians always have the right of way, mostly they do, but there are exceptions. As a pedestrian, use good judgement to be safe while out walking, biking and co-existing with the motoring public. One thing that pedestrians need to remember is that just because they have the right of way, doesn't mean that the oncoming motorist will stop. Make eye contact with the driver of the vehicle and make sure that they see you. Make sure that the vehicle is stopped, or at the very least slowing before you step off of the curb. Be safe out there and have a great summer!

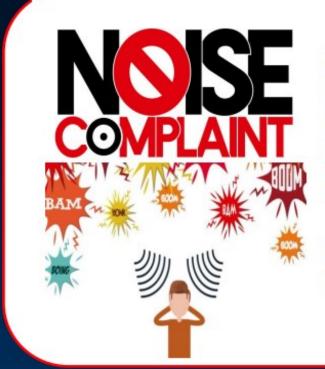
Streamwood 4th of July Fireworks

Enjoy a splendid, safe display to honor our country. Fireworks are discharged from Dolphin Park at approximately 9:30 pm on July 4th. Rain date is generally July 5th.







Just a reminder to be mindful of our neighbors as we begin to swing in to summer with music playing and gathering at residences. The loud playing or operation of a radio, television, stereo, musical instrument, or similar device is not prohibited between the hours of ten o'clock (10:00) P.M. and seven o'clock (7:00) A.M. Any such sound cannot cast onto the public street in excess of 100 feet from point of origin.

Any such sound which can be heard at a distance of one hundred feet (100') from the point of its origin between these set hours is in violation of Streamwood Village ordinance. 7-10-5 (2) This also includes car stereos 5-1-6(A)

Be Safe Keep Cool



Please know that the Streamwood Police Department (401 E. Irving Park Road) and Hanover Township (250 S. Route 59, Bartlett) are designated cooling centers. Poplar Creek Library and Park District facilities (Park Place and the Community Center) will be open this summer. Please consider checking on elderly neighbors and relatives. Residents with concerns or needing assistance are encouraged to call 911.

End of Life Planning

First things first, this isn't a topic most people are excited to talk or read about, however, it is extremely important. As Benjamin Franklin famously stated:

"...in this world, nothing is certain except death and taxes."

- → Planning can start at any age; crisis and medical emergencies can happen to all of us.
- → End of life planning is grounded in love and respect. It seeks to maintain the sanctity of an individuals life while preventing any more confusion during what is already a difficult time.
- → It can be helpful to work with professionals; there are trained individuals, such a estate lawyers, social service professionals, etc., who specialize in end of life planning.
- → The first step is the hardest, starting a conversation with a loved one, or thinking of your own end of life wishes.
- → The goal of end of life planning is to have documents (i.e. wills, power of attorney, DNR, etc.) completed, people designated for their roles, and also to account for what an individual wants their life to look like, such as when they are actively dying and afterwards.



- → People have the right to determine how they want to life as well as how they want to die, for example, does someone want to authorize a DNR, or do they want to be resuscitated, do they want to be an organ donor, do they want to be on hospice, etc.
- → People also have a right to decide how they want their lives to be celebrated, do they want a traditional memorial service, do they want to be buried, do they want to be cremated and have their ashes spread, etc.
