April is Distracted Driving Awareness Month. In coordination with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, our department urges citizens to drive responsibly. Distracted driving has become a deadly epidemic on our roads. Cell phone use — specifically, texting, talking, and social media use — has become the most common distraction. Other risky actions include adjusting the radio or GPS, applying makeup, eating and drinking. By driving distracted, you're robbing yourself of seconds that you may need to avoid a close call or deadly crash. Follow these safety tips for a safe ride:

- Need to send a text? Pull over and park your car in a safe location.
- Designate your passenger as your "designated texter" to respond to calls or messages.
- Do not scroll through apps while driving. Struggling not to text and drive?
 Put the cell phone in the trunk, glove box, or back seat of the vehicle until you arrive at your destination.

The Police Department will have extra officers on the roads throughout April conducting education through enforcement; funded by federal traffic safety funds from the NHTSA and administered by IDOT.

- If you use tax preparation software like TurboTax, secure your account using two-factor authentication.
- Don't give your personal information to someone who calls, emails, or texts and says they're with the IRS. It could be a scammer impersonating the IRS to steal your information. If you need to contact the IRS, and/or confirm the authenticity of a request, call them at 1-800-829-1040.
- Keep your tax records and Social Security card in a safe place. Be cautious as to who you provide this private information to.
- When you decide to get rid of your tax records, shred them.

It's probably a scam.

Smishing Scam Regarding Debt for Road Toll Services

Since early-March 2024, the FBI Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3) has received over 2,000 complaints reporting smishing¹ texts representing road toll collection service from at least three states. IC3 complaint information indicates the scam may be moving from state-to-state.

(State Toll Service Name): We've noticed an outstanding toll amount of \$12.51 on your record. To avoid a late fee of \$50.00, visit https://myturnpiketollservices.com to settle your balance.

The texts claim the recipient owes money for unpaid tolls and contain almost identical language. The "outstanding toll amount" is similar among the complaints reported to the IC3. However, the link provided within the text is created to impersonate the state's toll service name, and phone numbers appear to change between states.

If you receive one of these texts, the following is suggested:

- 1. File a complaint with the IC3, www.ic3.gov be sure to include:
 - 1. The phone number from where the text originated.
 - The website listed within the text
- 2. Check your account using the toll service's legitimate website.
- 3. Contact the toll service's customer service phone number.
- 4. Delete any smishing texts received.
- 5. If you clicked any link or provided your information, take efforts to secure your personal information and financial accounts. Dispute any unfamiliar charges.

ECHOS OF THE PAST

Brought to You By The Department's Social Workers

April 15th marks the 113th anniversary of the infamous sinking of the R.M.S. Titanic. While the last survivor died in 2009, many remain captivated by the Titanic, perhaps largely due to James Cameron's movie adaptation.

- R.M.S. is a designation for "Royal Mail Ship," an accreditation permitting cruise lines (such as White Star Line,) to carry mail
- Constructed in Belfast, Ireland, The Titanic set sail on it's maiden voyage on April 10th 1912 from Southampton, England, anticipating port in New York City
- Regarded for its size and opulence, the cruise liner appealed to many
- The largest and most luxurious vessel ever designed by man. The Queen of the Ocean, in man's estimation unsinkable, struck an iceberg on Sunday, April 14th, 1912, at 11.45 p.m., and sank at 2.22 a.m., April 15th, with upwards of 1,500 souls. It is reported that as she was sinking the band played "Nearer my God to Thee." Nothing solid, nothing certain, Danger in each step we take; The strongest ship that man can fashion, God can in a moment break. of society's elite; Captain Edward J. Smith was regarded as the "Millionaires' Captain," because of his popularity among wealthy passengers
- While sailing through the Atlantic, around 23:40, the Titanic hit an iceberg on its Starboard side (right hand side when facing the front) around 400 nautical miles off the coast of Newfoundland, filling the watertight compartments with water
- At 02:20 on April 15th, the stern, having split into pieces, submerged underwater, sinking The Titanic; throwing hundreds of people into the freezing water
- Approximately 1,500 people died, totaling 68% of the people on board
- For those wondering, a 1st class suite in today's money would likely cost upwards of \$133,000.00

FUN FACT: James Cameron has conceded that both Jack and Rose could have fit on the door.
