PPE is a common term in our language today when Personal Protection Equipment is essential for health reasons, but what about for woodturners? Is there a need for this?

For our health and safety there really is a great need for personal protective equipment when turning on a lathe. In just a split second disaster can strike so be prepared. This is not said to scare people away from the craft of woodturning but to prepare them to avoid dangerous situations. There are some, I guess, who think they are too good to need this first item, and maybe they are but from experience I know I am not. It is too easy to make a mistake or have something unexpected happen. This first item is a FACE SHIELD. Most



turners have their preference and there is a wide variety available. Having one and using it are two different things. A face shield sitting on the shelf does not protect your face. There are some average common sense things a face shield will help with like keeping wood chips out or your eyes, which cannot be replaced. There are also those catastrophic incidents where a tool is jerked out of

your hand unexpectedly and heads straight for your face. Or how about that bowl that breakes free from the chuck or an unseen split sends a chunk of



wood in the direction of your face. Those things do happen and the prepared turner will have his face protected from the damage of a flying object coming at the speed of light toward you.



Goggles can provide some protection and can be appropriate in some limited situations. Turning pens on a mandrel can be a potential but if wood chips off the goggles will protect your eyes, but the rest of the face is vulnerable.

When thinking safety it is best to be prepared for the unexpected. Injuries do happen in woodturning even when prepared, so it is wise to take all the precautions we can to enjoy the craft and stay safe. I don't like to take unnecessary chances with my face so I protect it. Apr 2021


