

Safety Tips

Declutter—can that be a safety tip? For some turners it certainly could be if clutter prevents you from freely moving around your workspace without tripping.

For others this may just be a good habit to once in a while eliminate stuff that is not useable any more. I have a habit of saving everything. I might be able to use it one day. . . Or as soon as I get rid of an item, within a week I need it. For some of us it can be a challenge. This past week I went through a box of wood scraps I've been saving. Some went to the burn pile and others I know I will never use went into a box I'll bring to the next meeting. Maybe someone else can make good use of them. Do you have some wood you could donate to others? Bring it Sat. and let's clean out our shops/studios.

Shopmade Burning-Wire Tool

AAW sends out various email with very helpful information which is one of the benefits of being an AAW member. In the recent email from the AAW Toolbox was an article, previously printed in the American Woodturner, August 2015, by Jim Duxbury, entitled Shopmade Burning-Wire Tool. You may want to take a look at his unique design.

Here is another take on the same theme with some innovations I have found in using burn-wires. The adjacent picture gives you an idea of the burn-wire but let me share a little about it and why I make them as I do. Burn-wires can be long (20") or short (12"). They can be wide or thin depending on the width of line you desire to burn. A short wire for a pen or handle is more practical than a long one which could be used on a bowl. On one end a heavy object such as a metal knob helps hold the burn-wire in place on the lathe when dropped between the ways. A wooden dowel on the other end wide enough so it does not easily fall to the ground is helpful. Mine usually are between 4.5" - 6". A screw-eye in the knob can easily hold the wire. People who play guitar often have broken strings they will give you or you can easily purchase them.



Picnic Day at Signal Center

We set up two lathes and guided seven visually impaired campers and several volunteers through the making of pens, key chains, and Christmas ornaments during the event. The 'Teaching the Visually Impaired to Turn' program has become a very meaningful outreach program for the clients at the Signal Center and is certainly a blessing for those of us that support the program. I want to give a special thanks to Jerry Schnelzer, Eric Schaffer, and David Fairchild for assisting at the picnic and bringing such joy to the Signal Center visually impaired clients.


