Frank Bowers is a funny man. He has lots of stories, which he'll tell as he is introducing you to the craft of woodturning. His storytell-



Safety Tips



When it comes to safety we are all ears—Right? Well, we should be because it will have some very personal effect on us. Let's think about what we hear when turning. Do you listen to music when turning? I know some turners do not so they are more attentive to the sounds of turning.



If you follow Ron Browns weekly emails you will recall he talked about this issue this past week. He described several sounds and asked what his readers would do if they heard such a sound. The point was any unusual sound needs to be investigated immediately. Even if music is playing in the background, (you wouldn't want it blasting so loud you could not hear what was happening with your turning) you want to be alert to any changes of different sounds from the turning.

That change in sound, a knocking noise, or a clicking might indicate danger ahead if not addressed. Is it a void in the wood, a foreign object uncovered inside the wood, malfunction of the lathe or something else that could present danger to you? Don't push through even if you are almost finished. It may not take long to discover the cause but it could save a lot of time and pain in the long run. God gave us two ears let's use them for our own safety.

Recruiting new Turners

Do you meet people that have an interest in turning? Occasionally I meet people who express interest in starting woodturning. We all know the value of getting good accurate instruction when starting so a person will be safe and avoid having to unlearn bad habits. My response is to encourage people become a part of TSW where they will receive good instruction. Brochures are available if you want to share them with people interested in turning. Donation Project Focus

Challenge for you: Donate an interesting Christmas Ornament

The Woodturning community is very creative coming up with some of the most unique items. You may feel you are not an artist or have the capability to be creative, but with a little effort you too can discover something new and creative. A benefit of Show and Tell is the ideas others gain from seeing the turnings displayed. Copying isn't the same as being creative. You could see an item and it will trigger a thought of how you could make an object using a technique or method someone else shared to come up with something a little different.

Here is an example of how this might work. I saw an ornament turned and then a small chain was attached with a charm hanging from it. That idea spurred the creation of numerous variations. One variation was to take a key, stamp the letters JOY on it, hang it from a wooden ornament and a new decoration was created. A while back a store closed out and I found some clear round plastic rings for 10 cents available. Now what could be done with those bracelet sized rings? How about an ornament? Some Leopardwood was turned thin to glue around the ring and a Christmas item hung inside will make a creative decoration. I do not consider myself a very creative person and especially not artistic but with a little thought things like this can be done.



There are a lot of people around us less fortunate than we are and we have the opportunity to help them by making Christmas Ornaments. How is a Christmas Ornament going to help someone in need? I'm glad you asked. Around the holidays ornaments donated by TSW are sold in local banks and other establishments. The proceeds from these sales goes directly to the Chattanooga Food Bank. We can and have provided substantial funds to this organization who in-turn help so many in our community that are in need.

Donating a little time and effort to create these ornaments can really bless your life, knowing you helped someone else. Wood turners are typically known for their generous spirit and willingness to help others. This is a way you can carry on that image. Being generous and helping others always makes people feel good about themselves.

One of the neat things about ornaments there is so much room for variety. The sky is the limit—you can hardly go wrong with what you make. Now that is not to say junk is acceptable. Remember people will be spending money on these so we want to give them something of value that they can treasure. I've seen ornaments made by TSW folks and they are usually very nice that people will buy and treasure. Look online for ideas if you need some help.
