Safety Tips








2021 AAW Virtual Symposium

Donation Project Focus

Challenge for you: Make at least 10 Pens for the Troops in 2021

The Slim Line pen kits are donated by Woodcraft. A turner donated about 200 pen blanks to make these pens and these will be available at the Sat. meeting.

How long does it take to make 10 pens?

Maybe not as long as you may think. There are a lot of variables but these → were made in 4 hours—so one afternoon. The blanks were already cut to length. These pens were sanded to 800 grit and 6-7 coats of finish applied. Then they were Beal buffed. Some embellishments were added such as the ridge at the tip and the 5 burn lines. If you did some of these things differently the time could be reduced a bit. This turning was not being done to see how fast they could be turned but to give you an idea of how long it takes to make ten pens.

Turning multiple pens at once

There are some time saving things that can be done when doing a batch of pens. You might think of this as assembly-line style turning. All ten blanks were cut to size and then the holes drilled (on the lathe). Next the tubes were roughed up and glued in place. All ten were milled on the end with a drill press but they could have been done on a sander. Turning the pens came next along with the CA & Boiled Linseed Oil finish applied. Each was taken off the lathe and buffed individually.

After all the pens were turned and finished the assembly process began.

Final step to complete the project

These pens will include a small note of appreciation and then bagged in a snack size zip-lock® baggie. (optional) (Woodcraft cannot donate the pens in the baggie the kit comes in because it says, “Made in Taiwan” on the bag and that is unacceptable.)

Modified Slim Line Pens

The above pens are a modified from the regular Slim Line but essentially the same regarding time to make them. If interested in how they are made see John Dekle at the meeting or contact him for instructions to make this variation.
