Both Doug and Jerry are excellent turners. They often bring excellent items to show in the Instant Gallery at club meetings.













022 TSW Club Challenges

Turn the item the month before as a sample for new turners or turn the item for the month but the same item cannot be used twice or two months in a row. (Example in March turn a mallet for a sample of what a new turner could turn in April.) There is a wide spectrum available to be as simple or complex as you want and your skills allow. If you are a confident turner you can help new turners by submitting ideas for them to do the following month.

Jan	<u>Multi-media</u> (more than 1 material, i.e. species of wood, wood & acrylic or metal) (8)
Feb	<u>Garden</u> (useful item for gardening or for the garden) (7)
Mar	<u>Multi-finish</u> (more than 1 item, could be a combination of items)
Apr	<u>Workshop</u> (something to be used in a workshop handle, jig, mallet, etc.)
May	Bowl for symposium (donation for the Empty Bowl project)
Jun	<u>Kitchen</u> (things that could be useful in the kitchen, spurtle, spoon holder, handle, etc)
July	<u>Sports</u> (related to a sports team or to use in a sport)
Aug	<u>Home</u> (anything useful for a home, art, clock, lamp, door stop, stool, etc.)
Sept	<u>Jewelry</u> (necklace, ear ring set, ring, shawl pin, ring holder, etc)
Oct	Ornament (be creative try something unique)
Nov	Personal (gift for someone, something a person could use)
Dec	Silent Auction (to be donated for the Christmas dinner)



Safety Tips

Safety is YOUR Responsibility.

- Rotate your workpiece by hand to make sure it clears the tool-rest and bed before turning the lathe "on." Be certain that the workpiece turns freely and is firmly mounted. A handwheel on the outboard side of the headstock simplifies this process of spinning the lathe by hand before turning on the switch.
- Be aware of what turners call the "red zone" or "firing zone." This is the area directly behind and in front of the workpiece the areas most likely for a piece to travel as it comes off the lathe. A good safety habit is to step out of this zone when switching the lathe to the "on" position. When observing others turn, stay out of this area.
- Hold turning tools securely on the tool-rest, holding the tool in a controlled and comfortable manner. Always contact the tool rest with the tool before contacting the wood.
- It is safest to turn the lathe "off" before adjusting the tool-rest or tool-rest base (banjo).
- Remove the tool-rest before sanding or polishing operations.
- Never leave the lathe running unattended. Turn the power "off". Don't leave the lathe until it comes to a complete stop.

Useful Ideas, Tips, Tools & Techniques

About 2 steps to the left of the lathe is a stack of plastic drawers filled with full sheets of sand paper from 80-2000 grit from Klingspor's Woodworking Shop. (10% discount for TSW members) As needed, 4 sheets are cut



into quarters and returned to the drawer. A quarter sheet is folded into thirds and put in a tray in front of the lathe. When worn-out it's thrown away and replaced in the tray. The pneumatic sander is hung on the shelf in front of the lathe. Roloc foam disc holders, hook & loop 2" sanding discs (60-3000 grit) in a plastic box are stored next to the lathe in the drawer of a rolling tool box. An ex-

tra roloc mandrel is available to be used on the drill press which is 2-3 steps away. When ordered, the 2" discs are numbered with a sharpie & filed in order.

Next Sawdust Session Mar. 26



From Taft Highway (RT 127N). After passing the Ace Hardware on your right, take a slight right onto Fairmount Pike (you will see a blue sign for the Signal Mountain Nursery prior to the turn). Continue for 0.3 mile to Stop Sign. Make a right onto Key Hulse Road. At the next stop sign continue straight (the road changes name to Lake Ave). At the top of the rise 0.3 mile, make a left onto Ivory Ave. Continue straight (slight right onto Chestnut Ave). At the top of the next slight rise

(0.1 mile) turn right onto Chestnut Lane (first right). Take the first driveway on the left...4412 Chestnut Lane.

For those using GPS. Ensure that you use 4412 Chestnut **LANE**, using street, road or avenue will not get you here. Also, if your GPS instructs you to turn right onto Mountain Creek Blvd after passing Walmart and Komatsu on Signal Mountain Blvd you are best advised to disregard that instruction and continue straight on Signal Mountain Blvd.
