Charles will contribute helpful information to turners of all skill levels so you are encouraged to attend this informative demonstration and enjoy talking with other turners.










Feb. Demonstation

Due to the shortness of each project Steve Pritchard demonstrated two different items, a baby rattle and making a bangle type bracelet. Most of the demo involved the rattle which was done in two pieces with black eyed peas inside for the rattle effect. After turning a sphere and hollowing it the handle was made to fit and glued together. The bangle was turned on one side then reversed and completed on the other side. He discussed appropriate sizes as well.

Useful Ideas, Tips, Tools & Techniques

WOOD BOWL TURNING TIP:

Have you noticed how shavings seem to go everywhere?

Here's what I do to control shavings and make shop clean up a lot quicker.

From the local hardware store I purchased a roll of replacement window screen about four feet tall by 20 feet long. Using small bungee cords attached to the ceiling, I strung the screen and formed an L-shaped screen-wall around the back and tailstock sides of my lathe.

The shavings fly into the screen and drop to the floor instead of launching all over my workspace. When I'm done turning, I only need to sweep around the lathe instead of every nook and cranny (and every flat surface) in the shop.

Also, another option, shower curtains can be retracted when not needed and pulled across areas for protection during woodturning.

Once the area around the lathe is clean, it's time to maintain the lathe as well.







