Safety Tips

In previous newsletters we have considered safety issues related to our ears, feet, face and eyes so this month we will focus on hand safety. Teknatool of New Zealand started the woodturning chuck revolution in 1988. The four-jaw wood chucks have revolutionized the craft for many people, although for many of us they have been in existence since we started turning. While mounting a chuck recently I realized some of these can tear-up a persons hand if the lathe accidentally start-

ed while mounting it on the lathe.

Has your extended "turning mussel", as Nick Cook calls the stomach, ever accidently turned the lathe speed up? If the lathe is stopped by turning a speed dial down to zero, it can easily be bumped up when brushing up against it. (Experience is speaking) Therefore, the safe way to put a four-jaw chuck on the lathe would be to turn off the lathe, screw the chuck on, then turn the lathe back on. Why take a chance of injuring your hand and be put our of commission for turning while the hand heals. Some jaws are sharper and more prone to such an injury than others but a good habit would be to always turn the lathe off.



Useful Ideas, Tips, Tools & Techniques

The woodturning craft is filled with gadgets and gizmos, far more than any of us can keep track of all the time. Ideas are coming our way at a fast pace with current media so here is a way to make them available when needed. Maintain an "Idea Notebook". File ideas that you may want to use in the future under logical subjects. As the notebook grows, split it up into more binders with different topics. Here are some possible topics: 1 Tools & Equipment, 2 Turning General, 3 Wood, 4 Pens, 5 Ornaments. 6 Segmented, 7 Projects 1, 8 Projects 2, 9 Toys, 10 Finish & Embellishment, 11 Projects non turned, 12 Toys non turned, 13 Furniture, 14 Casting

If you want to embellish an object and need an idea, go to the notebook or tab for embellishments. If you are making ornaments flip through that section for new ideas. It is important to continue to file ideas and update material occasionally. If it grows you may need a list of subjects on the bookshelf.
