Safety Tips

Have you noticed demonstrators often begin a presentation talking about safety? Why do they waste time doing that? Well, it's not a waste of time. How often we forget things, so these regular reminders help to keep us safe and enjoy the experience behind the lathe. A person can turn for years and never be hurt but with wood spinning at 3000 rpms it can be dangerous. One little slip or thoughtless moment can turn into tragedy. Maybe, we could liken it to parents that warn children to look before crossing the street, or teens to drive carefully.

Anytime I work with a person new to turning I try to go over a few basics like:

Ancor the tool to the tool rest before engaging the tool

Bevel, what it is and how to ride it or glide on it before starting a cut

Cut by raising the handle of the tool

45% angle of tool tucked into ones side for control (for pens)

Face shield any time turning to protect the face

Alert—don't turn when tired or distracted

What safety tips do you share when working with a new turner?

If you were doing a demo what safety tips would you reinforce?



I recently viewed a Youtube video of a professional turner, who has demonstrated for TSW, turning a project wearing a long sleeve jacket that had long dangling tabs. I'm sure he did not think of the safety hazard his jacket presented. We all need reminders to stay safe. Stay safe and keep turning.



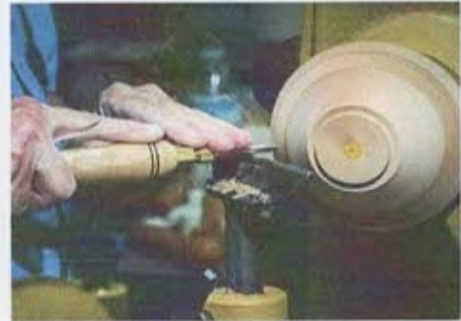
2021 AAW Virtual Symposium
