## Vazquez aims to inspire love for music through teaching

Scar Vazquez Medrano's life changed forever as a young boy when his parents took him to the Palacio de Bellas Artes, a cultural center for the arts in Mexico City.

The equivalent of the famed Metropolitan Opera House in New York City, Vazquez was amazed by the grand sounds played by the orchestra, but particularly, one instrument.

"It was like love at first sight. We were seated in the first few rows and I saw the piano and was just mesmerized, he recalled. The grand piano and its sound were amazing to me, but I was also impressed by the skill of the pianist ...I told my parents I really wanted to try music."

Fast forward decades later, Vazquez is a seasoned musician who plays professionally thanks in part to his lifelong commitment to his craft in music education. In 2023, he and his wife, Krista opened Vazquez Music Studio in Columbus, Nebraska, in hopes they can share their passion for music with future generations.

In the fall of 2024, Vazquez Music Studio took another step forward when a grant from GROW Nebraska enabled them to move to their current location on the lower level of Pioneer Plaza, 2402 13th Street, Columbus.

"It's filled with colors based on our logo that was designed by our friend and local artist, Yara Ramos Hernadez," Vazquez said.

Additionally, they received a Pramberger Pramberger baby grand piano from an anonymous donor.

"We were very fortunate and are extremely grateful to have received this donation," he said. "We have taken extreme care in preparing it for use in our studio."

Vazquez Music Studio prides itself on providing "piano lessons for students of all ages and levels," but has undoubtedly become a go-to location for youth with musical aspirations.

"When I was a child, I didn't always have quality instruments and teachers," Vazquez admitted. "When I was exposed to really good instruction, it opened a whole new world for me. Today I find my greatest joy in sharing the knowledge I have received over the years."

I understand some might not want to follow this as a career, but those who do will gain the knowledge to advance. Students who don't go on to professional music careers will have a better ear and a life-long appreciation for music."

Vazquez has a rich history with the piano dating back to his childhood in his native Mexico. Even before the concert that "changed his life," he had a teacher when he was 6 or 7 years old who introduced him and his classmates to various instruments.

Vazquez quickly learned the guitar wasn't for him and discovered the piano. It wasn't until after the concert in Mexico City that he began taking piano lessons, but it wasn't smooth sailing from there.

"Of course, it wasn't easy," Vazquez said. "When I started music lessons, I struggled like many beginners do."

But something eventually clicked for the young boy, who practiced for at least one hour each day Monday through Friday at a place his parents had arranged because they didn't have a piano at home. His efforts soon paid off as he became quite efficient playing the 88 keys.

"My teachers told my parents I had a talent for music," he said. "I was playing more difficult pieces than required."

Vazquez was all-in when it came to piano. He studied through high school and eventually earned his bachelor's degree in piano from the National Autonomous University of Mexico. It opened his eyes to his true calling.

"I had this dream in which I wanted to be a performer - that's what I wanted to do," Vazquez said, who has performed throughout the U.S., Mexico and Europe. "But getting the chance to teach in part of a class, I really loved it and decided to switch. I still perform, but I truly enjoy teaching more."

Under the guidance of one of his musical mentors (Slawomir Dobrzanski), Vazquez relocated to the United States to continue

his education. He earned his master's degree in piano performance at Kansas State University and a Doctor of Musical Arts (DMA) from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

When it comes to Vazquez Music Studio, don't think of the stereotypical stuffy teaching environments that offer no fun. VMS strives to break the mold, as Vazquez acknowledged he had some

good and some not-so-good teachers in his adolescence. He prides himself on his vast knowledge and ability to coach young people to be their best.

"I strive to be a patient and understanding teacher. I want to have a safe environment in which you can play and have a rewarding experience even if you don't have all the knowledge yet," Vazquez said, who also teaches his students how to read music and introduces them to musical history.

> His wife echoed his sentiment, noting Vazquez is not only an accomplished musician but a wonderful educator who can teach lessons in English or Spanish and with the ability to adjust his teaching style based on individual students' skills.

The two work at Central Community College, Columbus as music instructors: Krista full-time and Oscar as an adjunct piano instructor.

They intend to keep growing the studio into a hub for music lessons with various instruments utilizing different educated professionals for those who speak English and/or Spanish.

"There was nothing like that here in Columbus at the time and we saw the potential," Vazquez said.

As the studio grows, Vazquez's love for piano and sharing it with future generations will never waver. He still has vivid memories of being a boy taking in the concert in Mexico City and discovering his passion. He wants that for his students
