Content & Conversation: Understanding the outcomes of General Conference 2024

<u>Regionalization – Passed!</u> The U.S. Regional Conference would be allowed to contextualize the Book of Discipline for its own cultures, just as non-U.S. central conferences currently do. Still needs to be ratified by a 2/3 vote of all annual conferences – will likely happen at 2025 Annual Conference gatherings.

Revised Social Principles - Passed!

The voting body of GC2024 adopted revisions to the social principles that included three different protections for gender identity and seven for sexual orientation. These do not need further ratification – they now call for the church to live into these aspirational goals.

Remove anti-lgbtq+ language - Passed!

The General Conference voted by *overwhelming majorities* to remove from the BOD the discriminatory language and bans related to LGBTQ+ people. **HOWEVER**: These changes bring the Book of Discipline back to a neutral place, but they do not *prevent* discrimination against LGBTQ+ individuals and communities, they merely states that discrimination is no longer the church's default; the *option* to discriminate still exists.

Why is "Called to Love" and our work as a Reconciling Ministry still critical?

I'd like to share some words from Rev. David W. Meredith, openly gay former pastor of Clifton UMC in Cincinnati, and a leader within the Reconciling Ministries Network. He made this statement at the end of June:

I've been doing quite a bit of reflecting since the 2024 General Conference and the pivot it made from mandated harm toward lgbtq+ persons. It is a significant shift and yet incomplete. In the United Methodist Church and the public square, full equality and justice for persons who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer has not been accomplished. Yes, there has been progress. Thanks to years of hardworking faithful folk and God's presence and persistence. Nevertheless, the current state of church and world is still a challenge. Let me be clear.

- · It's not as bad the days before Stonewall, unless you're a trans teen of color.
- · It's not as bad as the UMC before the deletion of the "homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching" clause from the United Methodist Book of Discipline, **unless you're non-gender binary, explaining and defending yourself** before a District Committee on Ministry.
- · It's not as bad as the season before governmental and corporate decisions to not discriminate in the work place, unless you are restricted from posting a rainbow flag in your Zoom camera, office, or classroom.
- · It's not as bad as forty years of unjust laws against persons who were lgbtq+, their friends, families, neighbors, allies, pastors, and congregations in the United Methodist denomination, **unless your congregation is still opposed to you or your district/conference is notably silent.**
- · It's not as bad as the time before marriage equality, **unless you are still waiting to be married in your home church.**

As PRIDE month comes to a close, and as the implementation of lgbtq+ justice in the UMC unfolds, I realize that my own re-commitment to this work is not only called for, but a world stands in wait, hungry for it to be realized. PRIDE is celebration and it is recommitment to the work! I hope your glitter blessings and message t-shirts and welcoming banners will continue in daily action at home, school, work, play, church, public square, and voting booth.
