So here we are in 2021 and if we know nothing else, we know we're glad 2020 is behind us! This year will be the year that, eventually, we come out of our pandemic-imposed isolation and begin exploring again how to be the church, albeit in a vastly different world than the one we thought we were entering last year at this time. A year ago, "live-stream worship" was not even a thought, now it's the primary way in which we share together in worship each week. And while that will change as people are vaccinated and we are able to return to in-person worship, it won't go away - it will never go away. We will always have a "virtual" congregation who joins us online to worship



rather than in-person, and that means we have to adapt and grow in order to meet the needs of those friends. Other means of digital worship and ministry will become increasingly important for us as well.

Reaching new people will be an important priority for us in 2021 - as soon, that is, as we can get back out into public places and inviting people into our spaces again. I can't believe I'm hearing myself saying this (metaphorically of course, I'm actually writing, not speaking) but I can't wait to hear the racket of Scouts running through every corner of the building, of children gathering to sing in the fellowship hall, of dishes rattling (and breaking) in the kitchen, of peoples' phones making noise during worship! Even as an introvert who LOVES his alone time, I can't wait to go sit at Northstar or Java Central just to meet and talk with folks, or to prepare meals in the kitchen for college students. I can't wait for the building to be a little dirty again because it's being used! But as scripture suggests, everything old is new again. We will do these things, but we will do them in new ways, because a post-Covid world will not be the same as the pre-Covid world was.

Like the many restaurants and small businesses that were unable to adapt to meet the conditions that the pandemic forced upon them and closed, churches that do not adapt to a new way of being church in a post-Covid world will not last long either. Thinking that everything will be "fine" if we just go back to doing what we did before when nothing is like it was before will not serve the church or the community well. All of us have been impacted, some more than others, by the coronavirus pandemic, as has the community in which we are called to serve. Thinking about this within a theological framework, one might suggest that we are in a death and resurrection moment. Our old way of being, both in the world and in the church, has died and we are in a resurrection moment.

"What we will be has not yet been revealed to us, but being made in the image of God, we shall be like God..."

As we enter this new year together, I trust in the presence of God in all that we do, that God's Spirit is guiding us as we venture into the uncharted waters. And like those whom Moses led out of Egypt, like those Joshua led into the Promised Land, the waters will not part until we take that first step in faith, getting our feet wet while trusting in God's presence.

So, may your feet be soaked, and may your vision be cleared, because God goes with us into new places when we go in faith together! Amen.

Update from the Finance Committee

As the calendar flips to 2021, when I was asked to take over as the Chair of the Finance Committee, I never expected to have to help manage through a 10 plus month-long church closure. Without having regular church services, it has required the Finance Committee to look at new ways to reach out to the congregation. When the committee last reached out to the congregation, we were looking at a significant revenue shortfall for the year. I was unsure if it would make a difference. And you responded, proving me wrong. In my six months as the Finance Chair, I continue to be amazed by the resolve and generosity of our congregation.

In October, when I last communicated with the congregation, our un-pledged giving, which accounts for 26% of our expected income, was at 46% of our budget for the year. We reached out to the congregation and you responded. I'm happy to tell you that as of the end of the year, we have been able to meet our 2020 income budget. We were only able to achieve our 2020 revenue goals with the giving and dedication of the entire congregation. Because of your resolve, we have been able to keep providing the same dedicated level of service during these difficult times.

Now we begin looking to 2021 and the needs of the Church for the coming year. We are looking at the budget and working with the committees to ensure that we are using the funds given to the Church to promote Christ's vision for his Church. If you have not turned in an estimate of giving card, I urge you to do so. We will be meeting and setting the budget in early January for the upcoming year.

And as always, if your financial situation has changed and you need to revise your estimated giving, please reach out to Bill Ruff, our Financial Secretary, and he can make those adjustments for you.

M&Ms Parents Small Group



Church Candle History

Each Advent and Christmas season when we bring out all the extra candles and I see the labels on the cartons, I am reminded of my childhood growing up in Syracuse, NY where America's religious



candle industry began. There were once five candle factories in Syracuse and our home was right up the road from two of them. You will find candles made by all of these companies in the cupboards here at Church of the Master.

Will Candle Company began in 1855 in the Syracuse backyard of a Bavarian immigrant by the name of Anton Will. Natural beeswax was purchased from the local farmers and Anton personally inspected every lot to insure only the finest quality for his church candle products. Anton Will's untimely death in 1866 forced his wife Rosina to run the business and even expand it while raising three young sons. In 1875, Rosina married Christian Eckerman, the owner of another new candle company in Syracuse that had ties to the Francis Baumer Candle Company, resulting in a family merger that in 1896 became the new Will & Baumer. Ownership of Will & Baumer remained within the Will, Baumer and Eckerman families until 1972. Will & Baumer relocated in 2009 to Lewisburg, Tennessee and has become primarily a candle importer rather than a manufacturer.

Francis Baumer recruited Jacob Steigerwald, a young yet accomplished Bavarian candle designer and for 16 years, Steigerwald supervised production at the **Francis Baumer Candle Company**. When Baumer merged his company with the Eckerman & Will Candle Company, Steigerwald faced a decision: should he join the bigger, diversified company and share in the increased responsibilities? Or should he concentrate on religious traditions? His answer was **Cathedral Candle Company**, opened in 1897. Over 100 years later, it is owned and operated by the fourth generation of Steigerwalds. Cathedral still makes only church candles. The original factory, on Kirkpatrick Street in Syracuse, remains the core of today's expanded manufacturing facility. Assembly lines of molds, presses, and inventive automation devices built to Jacob Steigerwald's specifications still operate there today, alongside modern state-of-the-art candle manufacturing equipment built to Cathedral's specifications.

Muench-Kreuzer Candle Co. was founded in 1925 by brothers Alexis and Norbert Muench and their cousin, Fredrick Kreuzer. It adopted the **Emkay** name, a play on the company's original name, because many customers did not know how to pronounce Muench-Kreuzer. For many years, it made commercial candles for use in people's homes, as well as religious candles. It sold candles directly to the public from a retail store in the front of its building. Muench-Kreuzer shut down in 2011 and the factory was sold and converted into apartments. Emkay candles are sold by most major religious product supply companies, including Cokesbury, serving the United Methodist Church worldwide.
