

A Letter from Pastor Jay By Rev. Jay Anderson

The January RENEW Newsletter was barely in your hands (or inboxes) with my article recapping 2022 with all its change and accomplishments and my "forecast" of more change to come in 2023 when we announced on January 8th that I would be retiring from Pastoral Ministry effective July 1st of this year. Clearly I knew that my retirement was part of the change that I alluded to in that message, but that was neither the time nor the vehicle through which to make that announcement. I sincerely appreciate all of the well-wishes, the hugs, and the tears that have followed that announcement, but as I said that Sunday morning, we are not done yet. We have work to do and ministry to plan for that needs to happen regardless of who the Senior Pastor is at the moment. So, we move on.

We are in a worship series that ties our lectionary readings to the subject of mental health, particularly depression and other forms of mental illness. This is an issue that has impacted my family for many years on multiple fronts. My mother, my sister, and I all worked in a psychiatric hospital in my hometown in various capac-

ities over the course of many years, providing both care and service to both patients and staff. On the other side of the issue, I

and other members of our family have sought therapy and mental health guidance at various times in our lives to help deal with pain, grief, loss, depression, marital issues, and the like. And many of you had a near front row seat when our son-in-law took his own life not long after we first came to Church of the Master. Mental illness touches many, many people in all of our families, our workplaces, our congregations, and throughout the world, and so it's important that we don't shy away from dealing with these issues in our teaching, our preaching, and our care with and for one another. This is all of our work as disciples of Jesus Christ, and that's one reason why we felt called to bring this series at this time and it will continue until Lent begins in February.

We are six months into an experiment in leadership with our Leadership Council functioning in place of an Administrative Board and other committees. This model, used in many churches across many denominations, has been embraced by some and still presents a challenge for others, but it is accomplishing some of the major things that we hoped it would do, and that is eliminate an overabundance of what have proven to be unnecessary meetings, freeing people up to serve in more ways, to engage in bible study, or to just have much needed time with family. The transition to this new model was over a year in the planning and led directly to the added emphasis on Discipleship and the commitments we all made in various areas of Discipleship this past fall. As a result of those commitments we have developed the Visitation and Prayer Teams that I mentioned in a weekly note last month, and will lead to the variety of book and bible studies being offered by a several people during Lent this year. All of this goes to show that if we invite people into a disciple relationship with Jesus Christ, enable that to happen in ways that work for them and their family, model for them what discipleship might look like, and then get out of the way, the Holy Spirit will step in and make stuff happen! And that's just where we are. We will continue to tweak the workings of the Leadership Council, fixing the bugs that will inevitably arise as we deal with new things, and at some point (likely at the fall church conference) a vote will have to be taken in order to make this change permanent, but I think it is going about as well as could be expected right now, and as a bonus, we've drawn many new people into leadership who did not have the opportunity to serve before, so a win-win.

In addition, we have a couple of staffing issues to address. We have a wonderful staff here at Church of the Master, the best I've ever worked with. That said, staff turnover in churches is constant - not just here but everywhere. Randy Bennett came out of retirement as an architect to take on the role of Facilities Manager on a short-term basis and has expressed a desire to return to retirement soon. So, we are in the process of trying to work out what that is going to look like in the next few weeks. Likewise, the sudden and unexpected resignation of our Youth Director in November left us scrambling until Bob Keep agreed to step in on an interim basis to work with our youth. We need to fill that position as well, but are also looking at some "out of the box" options for youth leadership as well. That said, I and some of our youth parents are in agreement that the next pastor should have a say in who the next youth director should be, so we're not going to rush to make a hire there. We are grateful for Bob's willingness to serve in this way.

If you've been a United Methodist for very long at all, then you're likely at least somewhat familiar with how the process of the appointment of a new pastor works in our denomination. If you haven't been in the UMC that long, here's a primer. Pastors in UMC congregations are not hired by the local congregation, they are appointed by the Bishop of that Annual Conference. We are in the West Ohio Annual Conference and our Bishop is Gregory Palmer. Bishop Palmer will appoint the new pastor after certain matters of due diligence are compléted. Typically, when it becomes clear that there will be an opening in a congregation, the District Superintendent will contact the Staff Parish Relations Chair (SPRC) to have a Congregational Profile completed. That profile tells the DS, the Bishop, and the Cabinet, about who Church of the Master is, what kind of church we are, and what are the needs of the church in general and in the new pastor that will be appointed. That profile will go back to the Cabinet where, along with other churches that have openings, there will be discussions about each church and what pastors are available, ready, or asking for a new appointment. Through a process of prayer and discernment the Cabinet will seek to match gifts with needs in determining who the next pastor will be. The "appointive process" is an ongoing process instead of a seasonal one, as openings occur on a regular basis - there are nearly one thousand churches in the West Ohio Conference. Once a candidate is selected an "introduction" is scheduled with the SPRC. At that introduction the SPRC has the opportunity to meet and get to know the new pastor. To be clear, this is NOT an interview. Unless there is some overarching reason why this person should not be appointed here as determined in that introduction, that will be the next pastor. At some point shortly after that introduction, then, the appointment is announced in both the new church as well as the church that that pastor is leaving on the same Sunday. Once the announcement is made the transition begins. If past history indicates in any way future performance, we will likely hear who the new pastor will be sometime in the late March or early April window.

So, as I said, we have work to do. I made a promise when I first entered ministry - first to myself and then to all the future and yet unknown congregations that I would serve - that when I got to this point in my career I would not "phone it in." That is, I will not slow down or slack off in the work I'm doing with and for you just because my time as your Pastor is short. I will give my best until I step from the pulpit for the final time as your Senior Pastor on Sunday, June 18th. I have too much love and respect for you, for this staff, and to the God who blessed me by calling me to this role in this place to do otherwise.

^{*3-}year-olds attending Dewdrops must be potty-trained, as we do not have appropriate facilities to address diapering needs in this classroom.








"Holy Troublemakers & Unconventional Saints"

Join us as we explore Holy Troublemakers and Unconventional Saints. This 12 week study will invite us to explore the concepts of holy troublemaking as modeled by the people profiled in the book Holy Troublemakers & Unconventional Saints, from diverse faiths, who worked for love, compassion, and jus-

tice, even when that rocked the religious boat. These lessons ask questions such as: What is holy and good trouble? What is not? What lessons can we learn from those who have gone before on this path? How do we keep our joy and inner peace while working for a world where all can flourish? What might my contribution be? Each week we will focus on a different person of faith who worked for the justice of the marginalized. The original book, Holy Troublemakers and Unconventional Saints is geared towards 8-14, we want to invite anyone ages 10 and over to join this multi-generational study. There will be no prior reading needed for each class. Come to all sessions, or pop in as you are able.




"The Last Week: What the Gospels Really Teach About Jesus's Final Days in Jerusalem"

This book is about the last week of Jesus' life. It is a week of extraordinary importance for Christians. With its climax on Good Friday and Easter, it is "Holy Week," the most sacred time of the Christian year. And because of its centrality for the lives of Christians, how this story is told and understood greatly matters. In this book, renowned biblical scholars Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan

seek to tell and explain, against the background of Jewish high-priestly collaboration with Roman imperial control, the last week of Jesus' life on earth as given in the Gospel According to Mark. Both authors spent their professional lives focused on the historical Jesus, but here they work together on a humbler task: to retell the story everyone thinks they know too well and most do not seem to know at all. This will be a six-week study, ending on, appropriately enough, Palm Sunday. Each session will last between 60-90 minutes depending on the depth of conversation we have. Copies of the book are available online and we will ask that you purchase your own copy prior to the beginning of the study on Sunday February, 26th at 12:30. Feel free to bring a brown bag lunch or to run out following worship and bring lunch back with you before our 12:30 start time. Any questions, please reach out to Pastor Jay.
