

A Letter from the Pastor:

I always chafed at the notion behind the phrase, "patience is a virtue." I'm not sure, if asked, whether or not I could list my virtues, but I DO know that patience is not and never has been one of them. One of my inherent flaws is that I can often be one of those people for whom instant gratification is not fast enough. I'm working on this, and I would say I'm much better about being patient than I used to be - at least on the surface - but at best it's a work in progress and I have a long way to go.

The season of Advent actually helps me with this. Advent is a season of waiting; a season of anticipation. I remember as a kid counting down the days until Christmas, no sense of what Advent was or was about - getting to to the ultimate goal of Christmas morning was what the whole season was all about for me. I'm betting it was the same for many of you! I remember one year I had snooped in my mom's closet looking for Christmas gifts before she had wrapped them and I found the gift that I had asked for and I was so excited. But apparently I had left tell-tale signs of my snooping. When Christmas morning arrived I found my gift under the tree and excitedly began trying to tear into the gift-wrapping, only to find that Mom, knowing I had snooped, had wrapped it, not in Christmas paper, but in wall paper, that she had very thoroughly and efficiently pasted.

It took me the better part of one of the most frustrating hours in my life to finally get into that package! And I never snooped again. Most years, however, when Christmas morning finally arrived, in a flash of flying paper, ribbons and bows, it was all over before you knew it and then what? Joy because you received that special gift that you so wanted? Tears because you didn't? Boredom because the excitement was over and what were you going to do the rest of the day? In different years at different ages I suppose I experienced all of those emotions at one time or another.

Advent is a particularly difficult time of waiting this year. Not because we can't wait to get to Christmas day although that's worth the wait - but because waiting for Christmas this year seems to have taken second place to waiting for a vaccine, or waiting for a return to in-person worship, or waiting to dine out, go to a sporting event, or take in a movie in a theater. So many of the things that, only a year ago, we took for granted now seem so far away, even distant memories for us. Perhaps what would be atop the list of things we asked for from Santa this year is just a return to normal...whatever that is.




It's hard to know what we can count on this year, who we can trust, who we can believe in. Our series for Advent this year, beginning on the first Sunday in Advent, November 29th, is "I Believe, Even When." Taken from a line by a Jewish poet found scrawled on the wall of a prison camp during the Holocaust, the complete thought is, "I believe in the sun, even when the sun isn't shining." I believe this series will help us to remember that, even when things look dark, even when the forecast for Covid-19 cases, hospitalizations, and deaths is frighteningly high, that God is with us and if we can just wait a little while longer before we try to sneak a peak at what lies ahead for us, that God is traveling with us through this passage and on the other side will be true blessing for us. I think you'll find this series particularly meaningful for you this Advent season, and I hope you'll plan on joining us in livestream worship and inviting your family and friends to join in as well.

Each week in Advent we'll have our usual livestream worship service on Sunday mornings at 10:00 am. And like every year at Advent, we'll light our Advent wreath as part of worship. We invite you to have your Advent wreath ready to go and to light your candles right along with us. This year, on Sunday December 20th our Children's Christmas Program will come to you as a pre-recorded presentation, called "Snapshots of Christmas." On Monday December 21st, we'll offer a special pre-recorded Blue Christmas service, intended especially for those who have suffered loss this year and for whom the holiday season - at least this year - is not a particularly joyful time. On Christmas Eve we will bring you a traditional Christmas Eve worship service that we will have pre-recorded and sent out to you early so that you and your family can participate in worship at a time and in way that works for you and your schedule this year. We will also offer, at 7:00pm on Christmas Eve, a live service of *Lessons & Carols* for those who would like to join us for a live service that night.

So I hope you'll plan on being with us in worship this Advent season. I hope you'll join with us in our Advent book study of Adam Hamilton's new book, *Incarnation: Rediscovering the Significance of Christmas.* Details on how to sign up for that are in the worship folder each week. And I hope you'll find all of this worth the wait, just as the Christ child who comes on Christmas Day is certainly worth the wait.

YOUR MISSIONS DONATIONS AT WORK IN 2020 (January through November)

Using the Missions and Outreach Committee budget, combined with generous donations from congregation members, we were able to assist a lot of people during a year of extraordinary need.

Food

According to FEMA, food banks across the country are facing sharp increases in demand and decreases in food supply as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Because of this, we have directed \$9,400 to local food banks as follows:

Westerville Area Resource Ministry (WARM, serves folks living in the Westerville School District)—So far this year, COM has donated 582 lbs of food and \$6,740 to WARM (\$1,220 from the missions budget, \$500 from the missions endowment account, and \$5,020 from designated congregational donations). This year's final drive-through food drive for WARM will be held on December 5 from 10:00-noon in the church parking lot.



NNEMAP (food pantry south of the fairgrounds)—We have donated \$1,600 (\$500 from the missions budget, \$500 from the missions endowment account, and \$600 from designated congregational donations).

Promise House (serves students in need at Otterbein University)—230 lbs of food and \$1,060 have been sent to Promise House (\$500 from the missions endowment account and \$560 from designated congregational donations). Planned dinners at the church for Promise House recipients had to be suspended during the pandemic.

Housing and Homelessness

The **Westerville Habitat Partnership (WHP)** is continuing to build while following covid-19 safety guidelines. They are building 5 houses this year—the most they have ever done! See a video about construction of one of the homes at https://westervillehabitat.com/. Groundbreaking on the final two houses happened this fall, with the goal to get them under roof and sealed up before the winter. Because most fundraisers had to be cancelled, donations are far below what was expected for the year.



However, the progressive Christmas Concert will go on this year—as a virtual event—starting December 11 at 7:00 p.m.! Stay tuned to the church and WHP websites for details. COM has donated \$3,000 to WHP this year (\$500 from the missions budget and \$2,500 from designated congregational donations).

YWCA Family Center (near E. Fifth Avenue and 670)—COM has spent about \$1,500 from the missions budget to serve 6 meals to families at the shelter. During the pandemic we have provided and cooked the food for the meals, but have handed the food off to Family Center staff to serve as one way to limit the number of people inside the shelter. We have donated another \$1,000 to the shelter from congregational missions donations (unspecified) to assist with increased expenses during the pandemic, such as increased cleaning costs, masks, and hand sanitizer. One unexpected challenge faced by the Family Center was the need for laptops to be used by students doing remote learning!

Open Shelter (advocacy center and day services shelter located downtown)—Because of covid-19, meals have not been served to the homeless at Broad Street UMC since March. Instead, COM volunteers have—3 times— contributed pizzas that have been passed out at lunch time by the Open Shelter staff outside their office. A 4th lunch will be provided on November 30th. This summer, COM volunteers also donated water, masks, hand sanitizer, and personal hygiene items to the shelter. All food and supplies were financed by designated congregational donations. An additional \$720 from the missions budget has been sent to Open Shelter to deal with increased expenses during the pandemic.

Other Local Needs

Laundry ministry—This ministry had to be suspended during the pandemic due to the large group size and amount of close interaction involved. However, individual clients can still call Sherri Mettle to get quarters for laundry. We have tried to stay in touch with clients via phone calls. *In December, blankets will be distributed to all the laundry ministry families.* Congregational donations made this year can be carried over into next year and utilized when the ministry resumes.



Charitable Pharmacy of Central Ohio—During the pandemic, demands on the Charitable Pharmacy have intensified. The number of patients increased by 30% compared to last year, and the cost of prescriptions increased by 338%! The pharmacy's goal is to enhance access to affordable prescription medications for low-income, uninsured, and underinsured Franklin County residents. COM has donated \$1,000 from congregational missions donations (unspecified) to help offset rising costs. For every \$1 donated, the pharmacy is able to provide

\$7 in medicine and pharmaceutical services. For more information on how 2020 has affected this organization, see https://charitablepharmacy.org/news.

Westerville Neighborhood Bridges—COM has donated \$1,000 from congregational missions donations (unspecified) to support Neighborhood Bridges' city-wide programs during the pandemic, such as supplying wifi hotspots for Westerville school children without the internet access necessary for remote learning, or stocking personal care items (like deodorant, feminine pads) at all of the schools for children in need. If you would like to supply a specific student or family need identified by teachers, social workers, counselors, and (or) principals, visit their website (http://www.neighborhoodbridges.org/). Needs may include clothing, furniture, or monetary gifts.

Global Needs

United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) Covid-19 Fund ("Sheltering in Love")—COM donated \$1,000 to this fund from the missions budget. So far, 230 grants have been awarded to recipients in 43 countries and 43 U.S. states. The grants are used to assist vulnerable populations around the world impacted by covid-19, including indigenous communities in the U.S. and folks in the Red Bird Mission area of eastern Kentucky. The grants address such things as food insecurity and the need for PPE,

handwashing stations, and other pressing needs. For more information, go to https://umcmission.org/covid-19-response/.

UMCOR U.S. Disasters—\$1,000 from the missions budget was donated to aid those impacted by fires in



western U.S. and hurricanes along the Gulf coast. For fires, the biggest needs were kits to clean up ash-covered homes and trained volunteers to accompany people back to their home sites. For hurricanes, UMCOR assisted with tarping roofs, mucking out and gutting water-damaged homes, and providing case managers to assist survivors with long-term needs.

El Porvenir—COM has donated a total of \$3,270 to assist with water, sanitation, and reforestation projects in Nicaragua (\$3,000 from the missions budget and \$270 from designated congregational donations). These funds were used, in part, to (a) supply mini-handwashing stations to homes, schools, and health centers lacking running water during the pandemic; and (b) help build a water system piped from a well to taps in the yards of villagers in El Rincon.

McCurdy Ministries— COM donated \$2,250 (\$2,000 from the missions budget and \$250 from designated congregational donations) to support this ministry in New Mexico. The preschool program is currently happening online via Zoom, but plans are in place to eventually move to a hybrid teaching model. The school-based mental health counseling service (Project Carino) has seen a spike in hours logged treating families by telephone and Zoom calls. McCurdy Ministries also provides adult education, high school equivalency, literacy coaching, and parenting and grandparenting support groups.



<u>The COM work trip to McCurdy Ministries that was scheduled for October of this year has been rescheduled for October of 2021.</u>

Gaston Ntambo (Wings of the Morning)-- COM donated \$3,680 (\$2,000 from the missions budget, and \$1,680 from designated congregational donations) to support pilot Gaston Ntambo and this medical flight



ministry in the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Gaston flies pastors to churches, sick people to hospitals, and pharmaceuticals to remote villages in a country where roads are often impassable.

Heifer International--\$2,300 in congregational donations will be sent in by year-end to provide families that are living in poverty with an animal. Earnings from the animal acts as a hand up, increasing access to medicine, school, food and a sustainable livelihood.


