I always remember back-to-school time as when we got most of our new clothes for the entire next year. Summer was spent almost entirely in shorts and Spring did bring a new Easter outfit, but other than that dreaded Christmas gift of socks or underwear, it was back-to-school time that defined any sense of fashion or style one would have for the next year. Oh, we also bought some school supplies, but - and here's a throwback to show how old I am and how things have changed - for the most part the school supplied all the pencils, paper, pens, notebooks, crayons and everything we needed for the entire year. It was a different time.

And I remember how at the beginning of each school year, back then, we didn't have "meet the teacher" nights or anything like that - you went to school on the first day and looked on the list outside the door to see if this is the classroom you were to be in and teacher you were supposed to have. There were no "gifted" programs or "advanced placement" classes, we all just muddled through together - the better students helping out those who were challenged, everyone clamoring to be the teacher's pet in some way, and just learning together and from one another. It was a different time.

These are different times as well. This is turning into one of the strangest back-to-school seasons....ever! We have dozens of schools and multiple school districts represented just in the youth and children of Church of the Master. We have many teachers in our congregation, some of whom are teaching in-person, others who are teaching online, and still others who have to figure out how to do a hybrid, mixing of the two. Rather than spending money on new clothes for school, many families are having to invest in laptops, electronic tablets, or upgraded wi-fi for their kids to be able to "go to school" from the dining room,




kitchen, den, or wherever there is room while the parents are also working from home. These are different times...we've never done it this way before!

Yet, even as so many things seem to be changing all around us - as though life is being lived in a blender - some things remain constant. Kids, regardless of how much things are different for you this year, despite how stress levels might be higher at home at times, know that your parents love you more than ever and that they are trying their best to be parent, teacher, coach, friend, and role model in all the best ways. And parents, even as things are changing in ways none of us ever imagined, know that your kids understand - maybe more than you may realize - that this is hard for you too, that you are nervous about how it's all going to work out, and when things will get back to "normal."

I'm reminded of the meme that says something to the effect of "Don't let stress kill you - let the church help!" We know the intent of that message, even if it didn't come across in the way it was intended! In these times, the church is forced to do thinks differently as well. While the building is closed - we're still here (the church was NEVER the building anyway)! While some things look very different than what they have looked like in the past, God is constant, the love of God is unchanging, and the presence of the Holy Spirit is everywhere - in your "back-to-school" places and your "work-from-home" spaces. Things look different here - VBS and youth and children's ministry, Sunday School classes, even worship being done online - but the church is here. There is no virus, no pandemic, no shut-down that can stop us from being the church for one another and for those we know outside the church. There is no mask that can stop a prayer - there is no "safe distance" that the love of Jesus Christ cannot reach. As we share in Telecare calls, Zoom meetings and classes, online worship, and all that this time has foisted upon us, know that your church, and your church family is here - we're willing and able to help in any way we can. These are different times - but the God of all time is here with us and works through us. What more do we need?

Dear Otterbein neighbors,

I am writing today to keep you informed about Otterbein University's plans for the fall. As you know, Otterbein students are an important part of our vibrant community. They shop and work at local businesses, volunteer with local non-profit organizations, teach in local schools — they care about this community.

We've heard loud and clear from our students that they want to come back to campus. And Otterbein and Westerville want them to come back — safety. That's why we've worked hard to develop thorough plans in consultation with Franklin County Public Health and OhioHealth (Otterbein's campus healthcare provider). We've also followed recommendations of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Ohio Department of Health every step of the way.

Based on current COVID-19 trends, Franklin County Public Health (FCPH) has recommended Otterbein adopt a phased approach as the safest way for our residential students to return to campus. Through this plan, our students will move back to campus in four phases that we will monitor as they happen. Assuming everything goes smoothly, the last phase of students will be moved in by Sept. 13.

Our semester started on Monday, Aug. 24. During the phase-in, some classes (including many courses for firstyear students and select courses with significant lab or experiential components that cannot easily be replicated online) will meet in person or in a blended format; all other courses will begin the semester online. Beginning Monday, Sept. 14, all courses will return to their original intended mode and about 75% of our classes will have significant in-person components.

You can review our Return to Campus plans and other information about fall semester at www.otterbein.edu/rtc.

We are counting on every member of the Otterbein community to do their part in keeping the community safe. That means wearing facial coverings indoors, performing a daily self-assessment, practicing good hygiene, maintaining social distance, and not gathering in groups of more than 10. These expectations apply on and off campus.

We want to be a good neighbor to you, so if you see any behaviors that concern you, we have a COVID Support Line and Email set up where you can report those concerns. Just call 614-823-1586 or email covid@teterbein.edu.

If we feel like we can't do something - God's power makes us strong.


M&Ms Kick-Off


