Youth as a symbol of vitality, strength, and success.

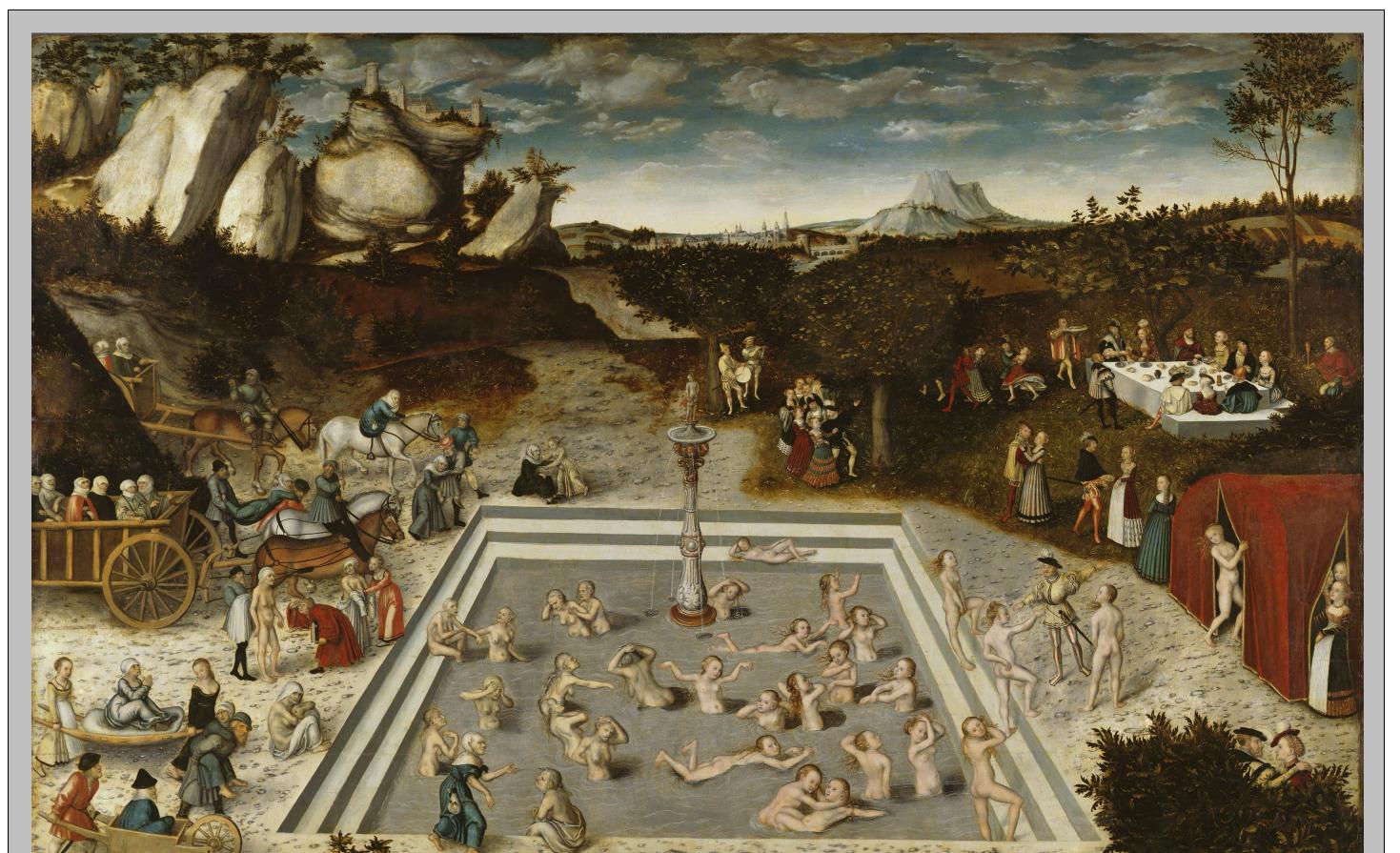
Ancient myth –

- → complex ethical & psychosocial questions [3,4,5]

# Dysmorphia / Dysmorphophobia

#### **Definition mental disorder:**

An overwhelming preoccupation with a perceived flaw in one's physical appearance [8].





"Feeling of being ugly, even though nothing is wrong with the person's appearance."

#### **Body Dysmorphia Disease** frequently comorbid with

- anxiety,
- depression,
- psychotic, or bipolar spectrum disorders.

Table 1: Beauchamp & Childress' 4 medical ethical principles, 1979 [6,7]

Principles	Patient	Therapist	
Autonomy [7]	elective aesthetic procedure → personal autonomy & self-care,  pathology of natural physiologic processes leading to psychological vulnerabilities.	unattainable beauty standards, normalization of aging commodification, choice of treatment.	
Beneficence [7]	vital, beauty, success.	economic benefit, cultural& societal benefit	
Non- maleficence [7]	potential side effects psychological illnesses.	safe, responsibility to discern body dysmorphophobia.	
Justice [7]	fair healthcare resource allocation.	cheap versus expensive.	

#### Theology – spiritual lens

### Christian scripture has no reference to Jesus' beauty.

- ❖ Isaiah 53:2: He grew up before him like a tender shoot, and like a root out of dry ground. He had no beauty or majesty to attract us to him, nothing in his appearance that we should desire him.
- Revelation 1:14-15 Jesus's skin was a darker hue, and his hair was woolly in texture. The hairs of his head, it says, "were white as white wool, white as snow. His eyes were like a flame of fire, his feet were like burnished bronze, refined as in a furnace.

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# Discussion

Fletcher Ethics Agape, ancient Greek is "the highest form of Love, Charity" care ethics -> People seek care, not correction.

#### Real need: Love & Acceptance

Therapist: active listening, understanding the patient's needs, considering cultural & economic influences [6,7].

hear their story	Help me understand how you see and feel about yourself?	What is the desire underneath?	on ethical concerns	informed and compassionate choice

### Conclusion

- Aesthetic intervention accessible to everyone (justice), respecting individual choice whether to use it or not (autonomy).
- Set boundaries for pathological disorders (dysmorphia), refer to a specialist [5,7]
- Goal: honest, evidence-based education & psychological support, contrary to commercial marketing.
- Support well-being & not perpetuate harmful societal standards.
