




The University of Virginia Latino Health Initiative has created several programs over the years for medical outreach into the Hispanic community of Charlottesville. Specifically, on the topic of medical treatment of skin conditions, there have been many screening events, education initiatives, and targeted interventions to increase awareness and understanding of dermatologic conditions. Beyond just the education aspect of this, the programs have worked to increase access to dermatologic care for those who need it, as well as to improve understanding of how to manage common skin conditions with over-the-counter treatments when appropriate. In response to community feedback, recent efforts have expanded beyond screening to include practical guidance on recognizing early signs of dermatologic conditions, strategies for managing symptoms at home, and navigating the healthcare system to access specialty care when needed. Ongoing partnerships with local community health workers, social media campaigns, and printed resources distributed at Latinx-friendly locations aim to reinforce this knowledge and empower individuals to seek timely care. The initiative continues to develop new ways to bridge gaps in dermatologic health equity, including collaborations with dermatology specialists to streamline referrals and ensure follow-up care for those with more complex conditions.

This poster focuses around the resources that have been created 2022-2025, as well as the evolution and expansion of the program.




