From the president: Grange meeting



If you've been to a traditional Grange meeting since 1867, you know the Grange membership begins and ends its monthly meetings with a ritualistic ceremony. This is typical of many fraternal organizations, like Masons, Elks, Oddfellows, Eastern Star and countless others. Traditions, customs and rituals are important, but not if they get in the way of a group's mission by alienating people from joining or attending meetings.

When I assumed responsibility as Whitepine Grange president (traditionally called "Master") five months ago, I felt a need to revive the Grange in its previous form—the one that served its members from 1938 (our chartering date) to the early 1990s when Whitepine Grange lost its momentum and went dormant for 30 years.

Now, almost two generations later, people's priorities and values have evolved. In an age of immediacy and action, we're not willing to sit through rituals and listen to words that have seemingly little relevance to the business at hand. This is not just my opinion; it is direct feedback from you—our members, our guests, our speakers.

Hence, Whitepine Grange is going to change, streamline and modernize its meeting formats. After lengthy discussions with our chapter's officers, we have decided to forego most of the formalities. We will still open with a prayer and we'll still honor our flag with The Pledge of Allegiance. You'll still have to hear me tap the gavel every now and then as a signal to stand or sit. But we're going to dispense with ceremonial marching, formal verbiage and lengthy dissertations written by well-meaning Grangers nearly two centuries ago.

I want our members to come to meetings so we can accomplish things and enjoy camaraderie. With active, eager members, we can continue to grow and flourish. Growing good things is what the Grange is all about, and I am hoping we can keep our membership reaching skyward to the sunshine.

Windows: A 60-year-old dream comes true

Just like today, money was tight back in 1961 when volunteers built the current Whitepine Grange Hall. There wasn't enough money for windows, so the building went without. Occasionally a good citizen would donate money meant for window installation, but it got used to pay more emergent expenses like heat and electricity.

It took 60 years, but the windows are now done, financed by "Friends of Whitepine Grange," a charitable group established





specifically to raise money for Grange improvements, renovations and maintenance. Cottrell's Construction was hired to do the

job, which also included removal of old, cracked vinyl siding and installation of new metal siding. The project was





completed in early March. Here are some photos, including "befores" and "afters" of an old building getting a new lease on life. This was a very costly project, and we are still awaiting determinations on grants to help pay for it. And...it is the first of

> several costly projects. Our next priority is to repair the driveway and parking area. This will involve scraping, leveling, adding base, and then adding a top layer of good gravel. We hope to have that project completed by late spring!
