Ryebank Fields is public land that was gifted to Manchester Polytechnic (now Manchester Metropolitan University (MMU) as a sports facility in the mid-1970s. The area was formerly a clay pit for Jackson's Brickworks; it then became an unregistered tip and was remediated in 1972 under the publicly funded 'Operation Eyesore' to make it safe to walk and play on.

The University abandoned Ryebank Fields in 1996, since which time this Local Green Space has naturally re-wilded into a richly biodiverse wildlife: an 11-acre haven, tended over four generations, by local people.

Developers acting on behalf of MMU, want to destroy the land for expensive housing. Local residents and their supporters are determined to stop this attempt to cash in on public land at the expense of wildlife and the community. Ryebank Fields Community Group has submitted an Alternative Planning Application to Manchester City Council for retention of Ryebank Fields as a Community Woodland and Meadow.
