



Hi friends! Your Pastor here!

We have begun our Lenten Journey together. Lent is a season for self-reflection, for fasting and/or taking on practices, and also for education. With that in mind, I am continuing the "Did You Know" series on explaining what things are in the church building and why we have them. These articles are an introduction to these topics, not exhaustive, but help us to understand the setting in which we gather together as the church and worship God in our community of faith. This article will talk about **the altar** and the objects on and around it. Given that we are preparing for Holy Week, including the remembrance of the Last Supper and Jesus' institution of Holy Communion, the altar area is particularly pertinent. So, did you know that:

"The altar is the most important furnishing of the church; it is the church's focal point. In fact, a church is built for its altar and not the other way around. At its simplest, the altar is a table of wood or stone from which the Holy Communion is consecrated and administered. It is the Lord's Table."*

It almost goes without saying that the altar is a sacred place. It's something that seems very common knowledge, but in the effort of being intentional in how we consider our holy space, it is good to start with the focal point. Especially in our context with the cross directly behind the altar, the combination of the area gives us our place to focus our attention, to place our site and our gaze as we worship. The whole area around the altar delineated by the altar rail and including the cross behind it is called the chancel. You can think of this sacred setting in parallel to a secular setting like a stage. We of course are not performing though; we give heartfelt praise and worship to God around the Lord's table.

"The altar occupies the holiest spot in the church. The church has itself been set apart from the world of human work, and the altar is elevated above the rest of the church in a spot as remote and separate as the sanctuary of the soul. The solid base it is set on is like the human will that knows that God has instituted man for his worship and is determined to perform that worship faithfully. The table of the altar that rests upon this base stands open and accessible for the presentation of sacrifice. It is not in a dark recess where the actions may be dimly glimpsed, but uncurtained,

unscreened, a level surface in plain sight, placed, as the heart's altar should be placed, open in the sight of God without proviso or reservation.

The two altars, one without and the one within, belong inseparably together. The visible altar at the heart of the church is but the external representation of the altar at the center of the human breast, which is God's temple, of which the church with its walls and arches is but the expression and figure. (FR. ROMANO GUARDINI)"

As with many objects and symbols in worship, the altar and its furnishings have various meanings but usually one specific purpose. At Faith Lutheran, we use various altar articles, some used by other denominations, and other denominations will have additional objects in the altar area. Pictured at the end of the article is one example of an altar. The following is a list of some of the most common altar furnishings:

"altar rail. The railing in front of an altar, enclosing the sanctuary, that separates the chancel from the nave of the church. In many churches, worshipers kneel at the altar rail to pray or receive Holy Communion. The original function of the altar rail was to keep dogs and other animals away from the altar in the early reign of Queen Elizabeth I.

altarpiece. A work of art that decorates the space above and behind an altar, such as a triptych (Greek, "threefold"), a painting or carving made in three panels, with the outside panels folding over the center one like doors.

candle lighter/extinguisher. A wax taper inside a metal tube with a long wooden handle is used to light the altar candles. Attached is a small metal bell, a snuffer, to extinguish the flame. (Pr. John likes to call these "acolyters" because the acolytes use them to light the candles.)

missal stand. A low wooden or metal, usually brass, bookrest that holds the altar book, prayer book, or missal and stands on the mensa of the altar.

office lights. The candles placed beside or behind an altar and lighted for the Divine Office. These candles may be lighted for any service, but are not required, even for the Office. They may be single candles (alone or in groups), a candelabra, or pavement lights. Also known as vesper lights.

sanctuary lamp. A lamp hung in the sanctuary and kept permanently burning with olive oil or beeswax to remind the worshipers of God's presence in the building. In the Roman Catholic Church, the custom eventually grew to burning a candle in front of the tabernacle or aumbry in which the sacrament is reserved, signifying the presence of God in the host.

SACRAMENTAL LINENS:

burse. A flat stiff envelope covered with material in the liturgical color appropriate for the day. The corporal, pall, and chalice veil kept in the burse for carrying to and from the altar at a celebration of the Holy Communion.

chalice veil. A small cloth that may be embroidered and white to cover the chalice only. One of the sacramental linens kept in the burse.

corporal. A square piece of linen about the size of a napkin which is placed on top of the fair linen on the altar. On this, the sacramental vessels are placed. The corporal may have one white embroidered cross at the front edge. It symbolizes one of the Lord's grave cloths.

funeral pall. The linen that covers a casket as it is brought into the church for a Christian funeral.

mundatory. A small linen cloth used to wipe the chalice, paten, and fingers. It is oblong in shape and may be embroidered with a cross in the center (aka a napkin).

pall. A piece of cardboard or aluminum about eight inches square, covered with white linen. Usually, it has a cross or some other symbol embroidered in white in the center. It is placed over the chalice.

purificator. A small rectangular piece of linen used to wipe the edge of the chalice as the Communion is administered.

veil. A large square of fine linen used to cover the sacramental vessels. The chalice may have its own cover, called the chalice veil. It is proper to have crosses embroidered in white on either or both.

HARDWARE:

chalice. (Latin, "cup.") A metal or ceramic cup used to administer the wine at Holy Communion. The classical style is goblet-shaped and made of precious metal. The chalice is representative of the cup used at the Last Supper (1 Cor. 10:16 and 11:25-27).

ciborium. (Greek, "cup.") A companion piece in style and material to the chalice, it contains the bread of the Holy Communion. The cover of the cup may be topped with a cross. Also called a bread box.

cruet. A small pitcher-like vessel of glass or silver with a stopper; used to hold the wine and water for Communion.

paten. (Latin, "dish.") A small dish of precious metal to hold the bread for the Holy Communion. The center may be depressed like a saucer.

pyx. A container made of precious metal used to hold the reserved host in the tabernacles in the church. A less pretentious one in the shape of a watch-case may be used to carry the host to the sick.


tabernacle. A small cabinet in which the consecrated elements are kept."*

When we see these items and objects used during worship, we treat them as important tools and helpers to accomplish the distribution of the sacrament. Let me know if you have questions about the altar, other parts of the church, worship, or faith in general. 

FINANCIAL REPORT Ending January 31, 2023

a. Offering Envelopes

- i) For the month, over budget at 108.1% (\$11,063 vs \$10,235).
- ii) Year-to-date, same.

b. Total Income

- i) For the month, over budget at 105.3% (\$12,817 vs \$12,177).
- ii) Year-to-date, same.

c. Expenses

- i) For the month, under budget at 95.2% (\$15,930 vs \$16,733).
- ii) Year-to-date, same.
- d. Net Operating Income (Total Income minus Expenses)
 - i) For the month, a loss of \$3,113 vs the expected loss of \$4,556.
 - ii) Year-to-date, same.

e. **Checking balance**

- i) Balance at Month-end is \$5,107.
- ii) Previous Month-end balance was \$8,285.

f. Comments

- i) The good news is that Member giving exceeded budget, and we managed to keep expenses under budget, so our monthly loss was less than expected.
- ii) It will be important to remember as we go through the year, that, even if Member giving meets budget, we will still be looking at a loss for the year, since the budget as presented shows a loss of over \$11,000 for 2023, even with \$20,000 from Endowment.
- iii) We need to view our church as one who is (re-)starting out after the Pandemic, so having some financial challenges is to be expected. If we all do our part in the coming years in the sharing of our Time, Talent, and Treasure, we can overcome these challenges, and regrow our congregation to pre-pandemic levels.
