Introduction to the day

Today's festival is a bridge between the Advent-Christmas-Epiphany cycle that comes to a close today and the Lent-Easter cycle that begins in several days. On a high mountain Jesus is revealed as God's beloved Son, echoing the words at his baptism. This vision of glory sustains us as Jesus faces his impending death in Jerusalem. We turn this week to Ash Wednesday and our yearly baptismal journey from Lent to Easter. Some churches put aside the alleluia at the conclusion of today's liturgy. This word of joy will be omitted during the penitential season of Lent and will be sung again at Easter.

GOSPEL MESSAGE: What Goes Up

The law of gravity dictates that whatever goes up must come down. Even with its dazzling mountaintop revelation, the transfiguration story quickly reminds us that if Jesus is Emmanuel, God with us, then not even God's beloved can escape death's inevitable pull. Jesus leads Peter, James, and John up the mountain, but very soon they will be on their way down again. Suddenly, Jesus is gloriously transformed before the three disciples; then, just as suddenly, Jesus speaks of his impending death.

The transfiguration is a story of both fulfillment and foretaste. The appearance of Moses and Elijah reminds us of Jesus' promise to fulfill the Law and the Prophets, during his sermon on another mountain (Matthew 5:17). The startling turn toward talk of his suffering and death gives us a foretaste of the "mountain" at Golgotha he has yet to climb.

For the church, coming down the Mount of Transfiguration leads directly into the season of Lent and a journey that draws out more fully for us the implications of baptism. For Jesus, his baptism by John at the Jordan was just the start of a journey to be fulfilled in all the ups and downs to come. This is how transformation tends to happen—not when we insist on playing it safe, but when we dare to enter more fully into life as it is. So, too, our baptism can be fulfilled only in the light of our mortality. God's voice on the mountaintop calls us not simply to behold God's beloved Son but also to follow where Jesus leads.

All this, however, is not meant to bring us down. Jesus' transfiguration offers a glimpse of an even bigger picture that includes both gravity and grace. It foreshadows what is to come: death—and resurrection. This promise of new life is a bright cloud that leads the church now, as it did the ancient Israelites, through the wilderness ahead.

MOMENTS WITH MARTY AND KATIE: *The Glory of God*

Theme: God confirms that Jesus is His Son. (Transfiguration Sunday)

Scripture: While he was still speaking, a bright cloud enveloped them, and a voice from the cloud said, "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased. Listen to him!" Matthew 17:5

P: WORD

God speaks to us in scripture reading, preaching, and song.

FIRST LESSON INTRODUCTION

Near the beginning of a long section in the Pentateuch (the first five books of the Hebrew Bible, our Old Testament) that described the worship practices of the nomadic Israelites is this narrative in which Moses received the word of the Lord on a mountaintop. The memory of the people's wilderness wanderings is evident in the details of mountain, cloud, and a volcano-like fire. The religiously sacred period of time, forty days, may denote an exceptionally long span of time for nomads with a lunar calendar or, as forty years, may mark the length of a single generation.

LECTOR: FIRST READING: Exodus 24:12-18

¹² The LORD said to Moses, "Come up to me on the mountain and wait there; I will give you the tablets of stone, with the law and the commandment, which I have

written for their instruction.”¹³ So Moses set out with his assistant Joshua, and Moses went up onto the mountain of God. ¹⁴ To the elders he had said, “Wait here for us, until we come back to you. Look, Aaron and Hur are with you; whoever has a dispute may go to them.”¹⁵ Then Moses went up on the mountain, and the cloud covered the mountain. ¹⁶ The glory of the LORD settled on Mount Sinai, and the cloud covered it for six days; on the seventh day he called to Moses out of the cloud. ¹⁷ Now the appearance of the glory of the LORD was like a devouring fire on the top of the mountain in the sight of the Israelites. ¹⁸ Moses entered the cloud and went up on the mountain. Moses was on the mountain for forty days and forty nights.

The word of the Lord.

PSALM INTRODUCTION

In its original form this royal psalm was probably a poem encouraging confidence in an unnamed king of Israel at the time of his accession or an anniversary of that event. Other ancient Middle Eastern literature contains similar odes celebrating coronations. The apparent instability of the monarchy described may also point to a time when an incipient rebellion was feared when a child-monarch succeeded to his father's throne.

The early Church interpreted this psalm as referring to Jesus as the Messiah. In its original form, it was probably a poem encouraging confidence in an unnamed king of Israel at the time of his accession or an anniversary of that event. Verse 7 was quoted in the narrative of Jesus' baptism in Mark, then copied by Matthew and Luke.

LECTOR: PSALMODY: Psalm 2

¹ Why are the nations in an uproar? Why do the peoples mutter empty threats?

² **Why do the kings of the earth rise up in revolt, and the princes plot together, against the LORD and against the LORD's anointed?**

³ “Let us break their yoke,” they say; “let us cast off their bonds from us.”

⁴ **God whose throne is in heaven is laughing; the LORD holds them in derision.**

⁵ Then in wrath God speaks to them, and in rage fills them with terror.

⁶ **“As for me, I have anointed my king upon Zion, my holy mountain.”**

⁷ Let me announce the decree of the LORD, who said to me, “You are my son; this day have I begotten you.

8 Ask of me, and I will give you the nations for your inheritance and the ends of the earth for your possession.

9 You shall crush them with an iron rod and shatter them like a piece of pottery."

10 And now, you kings, be wise; be warned, you rulers of the earth.

11 Submit to the LORD with fear, and with trembling bow in worship;

12 lest the LORD be angry, and you perish in a sudden blaze of wrath. Happy are all who take refuge in God!

SECOND LESSON INTRODUCTION

Written for a general readership in perhaps 125 Common Era as if it were the final words of Peter, this late New Testament letter harshly criticized false teachers and various immoral practices, while urging believers to continue their hope that the eschaton would someday suddenly arrive. The author claims to have witnessed the transfiguration, which by this time would have been known through the gospel books already in circulation.

LECTOR: SECOND READING: 2 Peter 1:16-21

16 We did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. **17** For he received honor and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, "This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." **18** We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain. **19** So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. **20** First of all you must understand this, that no prophecy of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, **21** because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God.

Word of God, word of life.

GOSPEL INTRODUCTION

In the narrative of the transfiguration the church sees testimony to Jesus' status as the eschatological Son of Man and the beloved Son of God. Just as God spoke on a mountaintop in ages past, so now Christ speaks, first in the Sermon on the Mount, and now from the Mount of Transfiguration. Matthew's message: "Listen to him." This Sunday, through these reading, we stand to do so. The church becomes the dwelling that Peter thinks to erect.

P: GOSPEL: Matthew 17:1-9

The holy gospel according to Matthew, the 17th chapter, beginning at the first verse.

Glory to you, O Lord.

¹ Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and his brother John and led them up a high mountain, by themselves. ² And he was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became bright as light. ³ Suddenly there appeared to them Moses and Elijah, talking with him. ⁴ Then Peter said to Jesus, "Lord, it is good for us to be here; if you wish, I will set up three tents here, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." ⁵ While he was still speaking, suddenly a bright cloud overshadowed them, and a voice from the cloud said, "This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him!" ⁶ When the disciples heard this, they fell to the ground and were overcome by fear. ⁷ But Jesus came and touched them, saying, "Get up and do not be afraid." ⁸ And when they raised their eyes, they saw no one except Jesus himself alone. ⁹ As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus ordered them, "Tell no one about the vision until after the Son of Man has been raised from the dead."


