Introduction to the day

Today Isaiah prophesies that a young woman will bear a son and name him Emmanuel. The gospel is Matthew's account of the annunciation and birth of the one named Emmanuel, God-with-us. During these final days of Advent we pray, "O come, O come, Emmanuel," a beloved hymn based on the O Antiphons, ancient prayers appointed for the seven days preceding Christmas. On this final Sunday of Advent we prepare to celebrate the birth of the one born to save us from the power of sin and death.

GOSPEL MESSAGE: Promises Made Real

Dreams are delicate things, often hanging in our minds only long enough to evaporate in the morning like dew on the grass. Yet dreams can also endure and shape the arc of social movements and the identities of people near and far. Joseph has the rare privilege of an *angelic* dream, of all things—a visitation from a divine messenger, beckoning a change of heart and a change of direction for him and the person he loves.

It is no small thing to change direction in life, especially when family expectations and social norms can make life harder than it needs to be. Yet, Joseph and Mary do a remarkable thing as they face uncertainty: They trust God's promise that something incredible is about to happen. They take the angel's words to heart and lean into the possibility of God's Holy Spirit doing something neither of them expected.

Joseph and Mary are at a precipice, a pivot point, a threshold, a new beginning. Isaiah's language reminds us of the relationship that stands at the center of this divine arrival: God is with us, God is with humanity, God is with (and in) the world! *Emmanuel!*

We stand at a similar threshold every time God gathers us in worship. In word and sacrament, God's promise unfolds anew, birthing love and grace in our lives. Such mercy may seem like a fever dream, a vanishing vision, an impossibility. Yet it is the very thing that undergirds our lives of faith, turning us time and again to what is most important: God's promises fulfilled. As God chose to be with Mary and Joseph, God has chosen to be with us, as we together bear witness to the Spirit who brings about a world where sin is forgiven and God is ever near.

CHILDREN'S CHAT

P: WORD

God speaks to us in scripture reading, preaching, and song.

FIRST LESSON INTRODUCTION

This selection contains a verse (v. 14) that speaks of a means young woman (almah) conceiving and bearing a son who will be called Immanuel. King Ahaz was being besieged by an alliance of Israel and Syria. The king intends to repel the threat by forming an alliance with Assyria, which Isaiah warns against. The prophet urges Ahaz rather to trust in the Lord, requesting that the king ask God for a sign of his promise of deliverance. Ahaz refuses to ask the Lord on a pious pretext because he has already decided to go the political route. God gives a sign anyway — the sign of a son. The promise is not of a righteous king for some future time but of a child who will be born in Ahaz' day.

There is no problem reconciling the meaning of this passage in Isaiah's day with the deeper meaning we have associated with Matthew's quote of this passage during a troubling time for the nation of Israel. God gave to the world a deeper, enhanced meaning to the verse. It's a much more potent sign - the sign of God's Son. In the midst of our troubling world, the people of God can point to the living sign of hope and salvation, the Son who is Emmanuel, God with us.

LECTOR: FIRST READING: Isaiah 7:10-16

¹⁰ The LORD spoke to Ahaz, saying, ¹¹ "Ask a sign of the LORD your God; let it be deep as Sheol or high as heaven." ¹² But Ahaz said, "I will not ask, and I will not put the LORD to the test." ¹³ Then Isaiah said, "Hear then, O house of David! Is it too little for you to weary mortals that you weary my God also? ¹⁴ Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Look, the young woman is with child and shall bear a son and shall name him Immanuel. ¹⁵ He shall eat curds and honey by the time he knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good. ¹⁶ For before the child knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good, the land before whose two kings you are in dread will be deserted."

PSALM INTRODUCTION

A psalm of deliverance from national foes. The psalmist prays that God will turn from anger and save the nation based upon the understanding that Israel's

existence is Yahweh's work, and because of that, Yahweh will not abandon them. The phrase "let your face shine" recalls the "shekinah" ("glory") or shining presence of Yahweh in the cloud and pillar of fire in the wilderness, in the tabernacle and the temple. It also appears in the blessing given to Aaron to recite to the assembled people in Numbers 6:24–26, a statement about how God's face will shine on you. A shining face communicated pleasure and favor, particularly that of a royal person. One can quickly make the connection to nativity story of Luke where "the glory of the Lord" shone upon the shepherds of Bethlehem.

LECTOR: PSALMODY: Psalm 80:1-7, 17-19

- ¹ Hear, O Shepherd of Israel, leading Joseph like a flock; shine forth, you that are enthroned upon the cherubim.
- ² In the presence of Ephraim, Benjamin, and Manasseh, stir up your strength and come to help us.
- ³ Restore us, O God; let your face shine upon us, and we shall be saved.
- ⁴ O LORD God of hosts, how long will your anger fume when your people pray?
- ⁵ You have fed them with the bread of tears; you have given them bowls of tears to drink.
- ⁶ You have made us the derision of our neighbors, and our enemies laugh us to scorn.
- ⁷ Restore us, O God of hosts; let your face shine upon us, and we shall be saved.
- ¹⁷ Let your hand be upon the one at your right hand, the one you have made so strong for yourself.
- ¹⁸ And so will we never turn away from you; give us life, that we may call upon your name.
- ¹⁹ Restore us, O LORD God of hosts; let your face shine upon us, and we shall be saved.

SECOND LESSON INTRODUCTION

In this introduction to the epistle to the Romans, Paul identifies himself and his mission. The first title which he assumes is *doulos*, which can be translated as either servant or slave. This identity is conferred by God through his call in verse 1, to be an apostle, one who is sent as an ambassador, whose authority resides not in himself but in the one who sent him, in God. What is the mission for which he is consecrated or set apart? The gospel concerning the one promised by the

prophets; the one who is both human (Son of David) and divine (v. 4); the one through whom we have received grace and apostleship so that others might come to the obedience of faith in Christ, that they might call Christ Lord and experience the freedom of being his slave.

LECTOR: SECOND READING: Romans 1:1-7

¹ Paul, a servant of Christ Jesus, called to be an apostle, set apart for the gospel of God, ² which he promised beforehand through his prophets in the holy scriptures, ³ the gospel concerning his Son, who was descended from David according to the flesh ⁴ and was declared to be Son of God with power according to the spirit of holiness by resurrection from the dead, Jesus Christ our Lord, ⁵ through whom we have received grace and apostleship to bring about the obedience of faith among all the gentiles for the sake of his name, ⁶ including you who are called to belong to Jesus Christ, ⁷ To all God's beloved in Rome, who are called to be saints: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION (ELW p. 151)

Alleluia. Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. Alleluia.

GOSPEL INTRODUCTION

The first seventeen verses of Matthew's gospel consist of genealogy, to establish Jesus' human lineage as a descendent of Abraham and of King David. This week's gospel seeks to reveal our Lord's divine source, that he was conceived by the Holy Spirit without benefit of human father. The story is told from Joseph's vantage point, who, upon discovering that his betrothed was pregnant, was ready to quietly divorce her, until an angel revealed in a dream the true cause of her condition. To reinforce that this is not Joseph's child, the angel reveals the name of this special child. The name indicates role and mission; "Jesus" is the Greek translation of the Hebrew, "Yeshua." In English, we would say, "Joshua." It means "he shall save." As always, Matthew, writing to a Jewish audience, shows how these happenings were a fulfillment of scriptural prophecies. A central fact we

must extract from this passage is the obedience of Joseph to the voice of God in the face of rather questionable outward circumstances.

P: GOSPEL: Matthew 1:18-25

The holy gospel according to Matthew.

Glory to you, O Lord.

¹⁸ Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be pregnant from the Holy Spirit. ¹⁹ Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to divorce her quietly. ²⁰ But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. ²¹ She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." ²² All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: ²³ "Look, the virgin shall become pregnant and give birth to a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel," which means, "God is with us." ²⁴ When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife ²⁵ but had no marital relations with her until she had given birth to a son, and he named him Jesus.


