Organisation's Mission and Goals

In February 2022, the Office for National Statistic found that an estimated 692,00 young people in UK who were NEET.

Active Learning initially aims to provide NEET students with tuition in their core subjects, alongside wellbeing and safeguarding intervention. Our aim is to make these services easily accessible to students and their parents/guardians so that the provision can be student centered, personalised, consistent and effective.

For many students out of education, having to access multiple services proves challenging and anxiety inducing, particularly if they suffer with mental health or have special educational needs.

The end goal is to help re-integrate children and young people back into education and help them to positively contribute to their communities.





Our Bespoke Learning

We know that every pupil has areas in which they excel and areas in which they struggle. We're ready to offer some extra support – whether it's to help them work through a tricky topic, prepare for an upcoming exam or even to explore beyond the boundaries of the standard curriculum.

Short and Long Term Provision

Active Learning supports children and young people that are facing short and long term barriers to accessing education. Our provision is designed to help pupils get back on track with their learning, support them to reengage with school, and increase attendance.

Our short and long term appropriate for:

- School refusers
- Persistent low attenders
- Those experiencing bullying
- Those at risk of permanent exclusion
- Anxiety and/or mental health conditions
- Those with health conditions or injuries which make physical schools challenging
- Hospitalised children or young people

Learning Curriculum

We teach the English National Curriculum (ENC) The ENC is a very well established and recognised curriculum known for providing a broad and balanced, structured education that is relevant and progressive for pupils. We currently offer a range of subjects at Key Stage Two (KS2), to Key Stage Four (KS4),

Primary Tuition

Service Description

SEND pupils with or awaiting an EHCP, that are looking for reintegration to education Looked After Children requiring additional educational support to achieve their full potential

Active Learning is provided either in the online or at a designated community location by a fully qualified teacher. The same teacher will be allocated each session, to help grow and maintain a supportive relationship with the child.

A tailored curriculum will be made, with targets and 6 weekly reporting.

Which secondary pupils do schools tend to place?

Usually our pupils from secondary school will be: on reintegration into school or awaiting special school and needing support whilst a new school place is found. Unable to manage their behaviour in your school. A looked after child requiring extra catch-up tuition in addition to their normal school day. Moving to home schooling and you have agreed a few hours tuition contribution to the parents or carers.

How many hours per week do we need to book?

At KS3 and for pupils out of the classroom entirely, schools tend to book five to seven and a half hours of tuition per week. At KS4 six to twelve hours per week is typical, depending on the number of GCSEs the pupil is taking.

For looked after children needing extra catch-up tuition, in addition to the normal school day, it varies from one to six hours per week.

Where does the tuition take place?

Depending on the needs of the pupil(s)', tuition usually takes place either in the home, local library or online. Due to the current pandemic, most of our sessions are online. We do however offer outreach staff delivering a small number of Covid safe home appointments for your most vulnerable pupils.

What subjects do you offer?

We offer English and Maths as standard. Depending on the interests of the pupil(s)', we often add, English Literature, Science, Other vocational courses. We match our teaching to the examining board your school uses. We also match up to your school's holiday and term time.

We also offer English and Maths Functional Skills to level 1 & 2. We are able to enter pupils on your behalf if required and we offer remote invigilation so that your pupils can sit these exams at home or at one of our examination centre.



We have worked closely with teachers and the Youth Sport Trust to develop a new GCSE Physical Education specification that will inspire teaching and learning. New and contemporary topics will help students of all abilities to develop a well-rounded skill set and prepare them for progression to further studies.

Students should perform the core skills/techniques in increasingly demanding and progressive drills. Progressive drills may start with the skill in isolation but should aim to increase the pressure and incorporate direct competition in conditioned drills. This must not be in a fully competitive boxing bout.






Understanding music

Online & On-Site Counselling

Active Learning counsellors are trained for this special type of work and are professionally managed and supervised on a regular basis. They work closely with Active Learning staff and other agencies. All counsellors work within a recognised professional code of ethics -BACP'S (British Association of Counsellors and Level 4 CBT therapy) and are fully qualified.

Counselling takes place either online or onsite in a quiet room within your school. It can be booked for a pupil in addition to our tuition or as a stand alone service.

Metrics

All counselling sessions are 50 mins long. Initially they are set up once a week, for a period of six weeks. At the end of the six week period, the counsellor and pupil will agree if a further six sessions would be beneficial.





Art Therapy

Often pupils will be struggling with issues such as self-harm, extreme anxiety, sleeping issues, eating disorders, depression, family breakup, behavioural challenges or bereavement

All art therapy sessions are usually 2-2.5 hours long. This is to allow time for setting out and clearing away the art materials. It is important that the pupil doesn't feel rushed to end a session and sometimes schools will request a 3 hour weekly session, dependant on the pupils needs, age and engagement.

Initially they are set up once a week, for a period of six weeks. At the end of the six week period, the school, art therapist and pupil will agree if a longer period would be beneficial.

Metrics

Our Art Therapy takes place either online or in the comfort and privacy of the pupils safe space within the community.

It can be booked for a pupil in addition to our tuition or as a stand alone service.





Auto Bikes

We offer attractive programmes of activities that uses motorbikes as a tool to engage positively with young people. Our partners have an excellent track record for engaging with some of the hardest to reach young people and helping them to break the cycle of anti-social and criminal behaviour.

Our workshop approach enables young people to learn about the motorbike (such as basic engine maintenance, the carburettor, suspension, wheels and bearings). Young people are supported to learn about safety, riding skills and the consequences of illegal behaviours; the course includes a day trip to our specialist off-road motorbike track.

Metrics

The course integrates practical activities with life and employability skills including optional AQA accreditations, CV writing, job search and basic work skills (such as time keeping, health and safety, first aid and appropriate work wear).







Auto Karts

Our course are tailored to meet the time demands of each organisation with varying options for full or half day sessions.

The course focuses on developing skills in kart mechanics as well as a volunteering, including taking responsibility of a particular task and demonstrating the ability to act as a positive role model to other young people

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
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
