Military, Industrial Leaders Are Guests

In a stirring display of industrial spirit, the workers of Joshua Hendy's Sunnyvale plant celebrated Navy day Thursday, presenting visiting military men and financial executives with an awe-inspiring production figure.

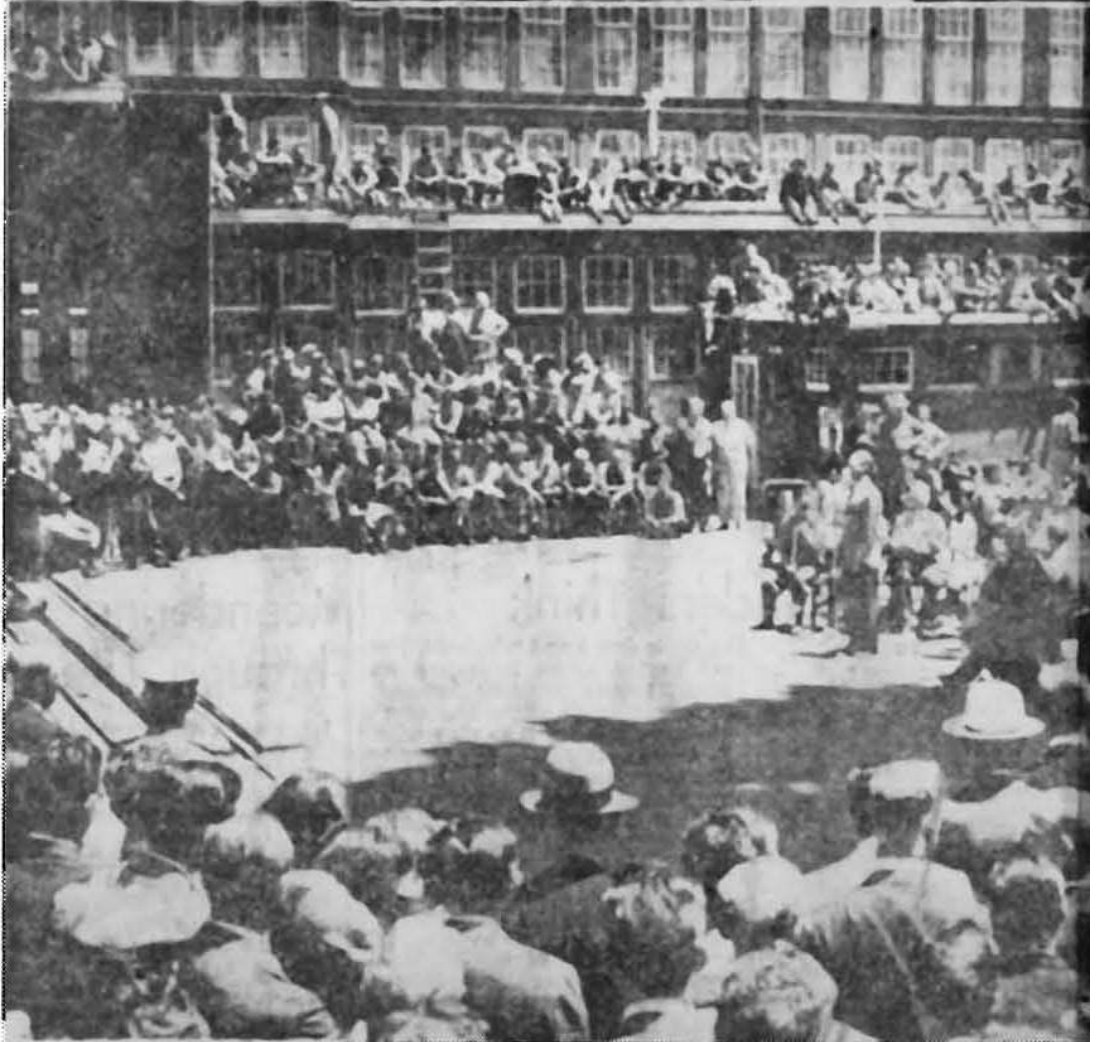
"We believe Hendy is representative of the finest industrial spirit—and with this belief we welcome you to our version of democracy in action."
