Dow Jones financial news tickers reported Monday that the Joshua Hendy Iron works at Sunnyvale, Cal., had been asked by the maritime commission to take over the unfinished contract of the Iron Fireman company at Portland for Liberty ship engines, but Edward C. Sammons, vice-president of Iron Fireman, said he had not received confirmation of the news from official Washington.

The Hendy plant had expected to complete a contract for 681 engines next month. The Maritime commission asked it to continue production of 77 more engines, the amount of work still unfinished at Iron Fireman when fire destroyed the engine plant of that company here last week, the report said.

Sammons said some of the 1200 men who were burned out of jobs at the engine plant would probably be employed in associated plants of Iron Fireman, but that he could not say at this time how many.

The company has not yet decided whether the burned plant will be rebuilt, he added.
