### **FIELD TRIP**

### Field Trip Tuesday July 22nd

Right now we have 17 people signed up for the garment district. Addresses of the different specialty stores and Textile Collections will be provided in the couple of weeks. If you are interested in going here are the details.

We are planning a field trip to Textile Collections, a family-run wholesale fabric distributor in Downtown Los Angeles with over 30 years of experience in quilting cotton fabrics. They normally only sell by the bolt, but they are opening their doors to select visitors (like Quilt Guilds!) to purchase by the yard from their flat fold selection which is currently several thousand bolts. They sell minky normally at \$6.87/yard if you buy the bolt it could go as low as \$4-6/yard if the whole bolt is bought. If interested in purchasing by the yard, it would be 25% more \$5-\$7/yard. You can go to their website <a href="www.textilecollections.com">www.textilecollections.com</a> and set up an account—no resale number is needed. We will continue sign ups at the July meeting.



#### **DID YOU KNOW:**

The exact origin of the Log Cabin quilt block is unknown, but it's believed to have existed in various cultures for centuries before becoming widely popular in the United States during the mid-1800s. While no single person is credited with its invention, the pattern's popularity in the US is often linked to the westward expansion and the Civil War



# **Traditional Quilting:**


Traditional quilting typically refers to quilts made with repeating, symmetrical patterns, often using historical or well-known blocks. These

quilts frequently feature a subdued color palette and are constructed with orderly rows and columns, sometimes separated by sashing.

Here's a more detailed breakdown:

#### Patterns and Blocks:

Traditional quilts are known for their use of repeating shapes and well-established blocks, like the Ohio Star or Nine Patch.



#### Symmetry and Order:

A key characteristic is symmetry in both the patchwork and the quilting designs, often with a grid-like layout.

#### Color and Fabric:

Subdued color schemes and a focus on fabric matching are common, although contemporary takes can incorporate bolder colors.

#### Construction:

Traditional quilts are usually constructed in a layered manner, with a top layer (pieced patchwork), batting, and backing, held together with quilting stitches.

#### Purpose:



Traditionally, quilts served both functional purposes (warmth) and decorative ones, reflecting cultural heritage and storytelling.

Modern vs. Traditional:

Modern quilting often breaks away from these traditional patterns and color schemes, embracing asymmetry, negative space, and bolder designs.

#### Did you know?

Nesting seams in quilting refers to pressing seam allowances in opposite directions to create a snug fit, like puzzle pieces, when joining quilt pieces. This technique ensures accurate seam alignment, resulting in crisp points and reduced bulk, particularly in blocks like four-patches or nine-patches.



Finished Layout: Center medallion + 4 rounds of blocks. Approx. 70" x 70"
