
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FEBRUARY 9 | TCC'S LUNCH & LEARN

FEBRUARY LUNCHEON BENEFICIARY FOOD BANK OF NORTHERN NEVADA

The faces of hunger may surprise you. They may be a co-worker, your child's friend, or the grandparent living next door. Each month, the Food Bank of Northern Nevada provides assistance to more than 130,000 people through their network of more than 150 partner agencies and direct service programs. Almost half of the

clients we serve are children and seniors. In fact, one in every five children in Nevada is considered food insecure.

The Food Bank goes beyond food. Their innovative programs and services attack hunger from all angles, working to move Nevadans from a place of hopelessness to health.

The Food Bank grew from a

small pantry to a regional distribution center. It incorporated in 1983 and has operated as a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization for 40 years. A donation of \$100 can provide 300 meals. Last fiscal year, they provided more than 20 million meals for neighbors who faced hunger.

TCC BOARD ACTIONS AND ACTIVITIES

The TCC Officers and Directors meet monthly from August through May. The August meeting is the planning meeting for the coming year. Below are highlights from the meetings. Minutes from the meetings are available upon request.

TCC Receives Greenlight from Gaming Control Board

The board submitted its 2023 application to the Nevada Gaming Control Board to host charitable lotteries or raffles. The State of Nevada pursuant to NRS 462 requires that all charities provide proof of their nonprofit status—and the total amount of prizes distributed—annually. Enforcement Agent Stacy Cohen approved the Club's application on January 11th.

Nevada Sales/Use Tax Exemption Renewed

Last submitted by Jessie Scott, TCC's treasurer in 2007, the Club's tax-exempt status expired in December 2022. Pursuant to NRS 372, charitable organizations must apply to the Nevada Department of Taxation for exemption from sales/use taxes. The board submitted a renewal application and supporting documents to the state agency in October 2022. Direct purchases or sales of tangible personal property made by or to the Twentieth Century Club are exempt from sales/use tax through 2027.

Mid-Year Budget Review

The board conducted a mid-year budget review in January. Assigned to the committee were: Barbara Korosa, Jane Chapman, Annette Luckow, Roni Nicora, and Barbara Oppio. They found a few items to be overbudget—such as marketing and mailings—and have developed recommendations for actions going forward to be presented to the board in February.

New Social Activity Club

We are listening to you and reading your luncheon surveys. In February, the board will consider adding a new social activity to its current offerings—bridge, mahjong, and book club. Diane Coons will be presenting a recommendation to the board for a craft club. Article 10 of the Club's bylaws allow new activity groups to be formed with the approval of the president and the board.

In December, we had a great end of year meeting. Lynda Knepper led our discussion of John Grisham's "The Summons". Judge Atlee has died and his sons have found a "whole lotta cash" hidden in his house. But neither knows where the cash came from, nor that both are aware of this unexpected windfall. Paranoia deceit and distrust haunts both as each struggles to decide his path.

Edie Ferguson has chosen Donna Leon's "Blood from a Stone"—a Guido Brunetti mystery. In Venice, an illegal immigrant from Senegal is murdered. And Guido sees more in

the crime than just a simple clash of cultures. As he pursues certain clues, an engrossing and complex portrait of corruption and greed emerges.

Roni Nicora has decided to lead a discussion in February on "The Vig" which takes place in 1990's San Francisco and features Dismas Hardy and Abe Glitsky--two of Lescroarts favorite crime-solvers. Many shady characters; convoluted relationships; and dark motives move us through a very fast-paced read! Have fun with this one!

And I will lead a discussion on "The Personal Librarian" by Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray. A Good Moring America Book Club Pick; a Best Book by NPR; and A Notable Book of the Year by the Washington Post this novel tells the story of Belle da Costa Greene J.P. Morgan's personal librarian. She is an extraordinary woman—intelligent, stylish, witty and (secretly) African-American. And she rises in a male-dominated, chauvinistic, and intolerant society to become one of the premier authorities in her field.
