Our Sanctuary's Response to COVID-19

Our hearts go out to everyone affected by the new coronavirus. Although, thankfully, no one in our organization has become ill with COVID-19, sadly two of our volunteers were laid off from their jobs, with one resuming her employment this past week.

All of our birds are doing well. Here at the sanctuary, we are following CDC guidelines. We are utilizing only a handful of our volunteer staff to keep possible exposure to the virus to a minimum. Each volunteer is required to self-monitor, wash their hands immediately upon arrival, as well as periodically throughout their shift. Surfaces in common areas are regularly disinfected. We are all practicing physical distancing and wearing face coverings when working in proximity. Also, we are not allowing any visitors at this time, nor are we interviewing or training new volunteers.

Working with a skeleton crew means that there is less time for emails and social media posts and interactions. Please understand if your emails and contact forms are not answered right away.



We were unable to hold our Spring Yoga in the Yard fundraiser and are not currently planning any public fundraising events until it is safe to do so, but we still must continue to raise the funds necessary for the care of our precious feathered flock.

Name: Pogo

Species: citron-crested cockatoo

Age: 20 years old

Favorite foods: sweet peppers, jalapeno peppers, pomegranate, almond in shell, and a variety of fresh greens

Pogo's story:

Before coming to our sanctuary, Pogo was living in deplorable conditions in a so-called "rescue" where he was kept in the bottom section of a small triple stacked cage in the corner of a filthy, fly infested room. Since he arrived without a name, we chose to name him Pogo after the Citronella plant genus: Cymbopogon. He is aptly named "Pogo" as he bounces from one place to the next!

Did you know...?

The word "cockatoo" dates from the 17th century and is a derivation from the Malay name for these birds, "kakaktua" (meaning older sibling) and possibly from the actual call of the white cockatoo as well.

CONSERVATION IN FOCUS

Yellow-Crested Cockatoos

The Citron-crested cockatoo or Sumba cockatoo (*C. s. citrinocristata*) found only on the island of Sumba in eastern Indonesia, is a subspecies of the Yellow-crested cockatoo (*Cacatua sulphurea*). There are currently 4 recognized subspecies of the Yellow-crested cockatoo: *sulphurea*, *abbotti*, *citrinocristata*, and *parvula*. The total wild population of all 4 subspecies is estimated between 1000 - 2500 individuals.[1][2]

The Yellow-crested cockatoo has suffered massive population declines over the last 40 years estimated at more than 80%. The nominate race and all related subspecies have been reduced to small fragmented populations of only a few hundred birds scattered throughout Indonesia. Three subspecies, *sulphurea*, *abbotti*, and *citrinocristata*, are the most imperiled. [1]

According to the IUCN, the Yellow-crested cockatoo population is still on a downward trend and they are listed as **critically endangered**. [2] They are also included in Cites Appendix 1 which includes species threatened with extinction. Trade in

specimens of these species is permitted only in exceptional circumstances.[3] The population of Yellow-crested cockatoos continues to decline due to poaching for the international pet trade, deforestation, and persecution as a crop pest to name a few.



Uniting for Parrots in Peril

The Icarus Foundation was honored to be invited to attend the very first meeting of the Parrot Conservation Alliance, a new program launched by the American Bird Conservancy. The conference was held October 26-28, 2019 in Nashville, Tennessee and ended with a visit to the Exotic Avian Sanctuary of Tennessee.



Parrot sanctuaries, rescue groups, and conservation organizations across the Americas came together with an urgent mission to aid all parrots. Helping to protect the wild parrots still living in their native ranges confronting habitat loss, poaching, and threatened extinction, as well as the non-releasable captive parrots facing an overpopulation crisis and widespread substandard care in isolation.

As long as parrots are considered "pets," there will be a market for them. They are considered a "commodity" by those who poach, smuggle, breed, etc. As a result, the international trade in illegally poached parrots continues while more than 1/3 of all parrot species are headed toward extinction.

The conference theme was **"Uniting for Parrots in Peril"** which focused on how each of our organizations can

learn more effectively from each other, and create new avenues for working together on behalf of all parrots everywhere. It was an incredible weekend learning from, and getting to know, some truly amazing people working in solidarity to increase protection for all parrots everywhere.
