Mexican Flame Vine

Pseudogynoxys chenopodioides (syn. Senecio confusus), commonly known as Mexican Flame Vine, orange-

flowered groundsel, and orange glow vine, is a climber in the family Asteraceae, native to Central America and the West Indies.

This vigorous vine features thick evergreen, deep green leaves and bright orange daisy-like flowers, which bloom in clusters throughout the year.

I received cuttings of this plant from one of our garden club speakers about a year and a half ago. Initially, I started the cuttings in water until roots appeared, then planted them

outside next to a sixfoot trellis.

The vine now covers the trellis, winding around it multiple times, and continues to bloom bright orange blossoms. It thrives best in full sun.



The Mexican Flame Vine is a pollinator magnet, low maintenance, and suitable for beginner gardeners and those with less commitment.

We celebrated the April birthday of our incoming president **Jeanne Isbell**.

Adorable Easter Tablescapes, featuring decorated fabric holders and Kalanchoe plants, were crafted by **Evie Campbell** and **Barbara Mlnarik**.

Evie Campbell's spring blessing included wishes for peace.

Our speaker was **Dr. Jenna Dye** (a Naturopathic and Conventional Family Practice Physician) discussing Seasonal Allergies.

Her suggestions for allergy relief included an air purifier, food modifications, clean beauty and cleaning products and managing stress (which negatively affects the immune system) by exercising regularly, getting enough sleep and having healthy relationships. Her diet recommendations were incorporating green leafy veggies and oxidant rich fruits while avoiding dairy products and processed and sugary foods.

To boost the immune system, she suggested daily Vitamin C, local raw honey and a saline rinse such as a neti-pot.



Supplements and herbal remedies that can be beneficial are: Vitamin D, Vitamin B12, Magnesium, Quercetin, NAC, Bromelain and Stinging Nettle. Recommended herbs were thyme, echinacea, chili peppers and nasturtium.

Dr. Dye's presentation was interesting and informative, especially since spring allergy season is upon us.

March Minutes were approved.

Susan Salembier presented the Treasurer's report. Jen Donovan motioned, and Nancy Jones seconded a motion reinvesting our CD for another 6 months. Susan Salembier spent a day exploring Lyon Arboretum, nestled at the upper end of Manoa Valley, just 5 miles from Waikiki Beach in Hawaii. It's a nearly 200-acre research unit of the University of Hawaii. She shared these pictures.

"The lush, terraced hillsides were overpowering to us desert dwellers. Some areas were highly manicured. Others, jungle-like. We felt dwarfed by the sprawling buttress roots of the myriad trees. Of course, bird chatter abounded. There were many varieties of orchids which were cultivated in huge swaths. A Buddha statue's hand position signified teaching or reassurance."
