Horticulture Tip | *Arizona Gardner* Facebook Page – Post by 'Addicted to Gardening'

Having worked in greenhouses for almost 20 years, I wanted to let people know a few secrets! Whenever you transplant or start a new planter, you need to remember that dry soil is just that, dry. When you water it, a lot of the water will run right off and out the bottom of the pot.

Is your plant watered? NO. You need to water in a large bowl or bucket and give the soil time to saturate. Then set it out and let it drip. An average 10-12 inch pot can hold up to a gallon of water when dry. Hope this helps someone, lots of people join these groups to learn a new hobby and look for advice! Happy planting!

The first Scripps Spelling Bee champion, an 11year-old from Kentucky, won by correctly spelling Gladiolus, a flower genus meaning "little sword". He won \$500 and a visit with then-President Calvin Coolidge.

Since then, the Gladiolus has been an integral part of the Bee; its various-colored blooms encircling the Scripps trophy, below.



There are about 260 species of Gladiolus, 10 native to Eurasia, and the remainder from sub-Saharan Africa.

A \$20 Billion Secret Garden?

It's time to start planting our winter garden displays and we all have our



favorite plant resources from Berridge's to Home Depot.

Home Depot runs 25 trial gardens in 9 climate zones in the United States to determine what will grow best and where it will grow. The breeders gather once a year so Home Depot corporate buyers can evaluate what to stock for their garden customers.

Breeders are not the only specialists that Home Depot consults. The company even sends a design team to Paris Fashion Week each year to see what the latest color trends are!

So, you might want to check with your local Home Depot to see what their research trials have discovered and to keep an eye out for any Paris color trends, too.
