

### Scottsdale's Many Celebrities

Scottsdale may be known as a place where you can see famous people - maybe at Fashion Square, or in Old Town, or even hiking in the Preserve.

But did you know Scottsdale is also home to many famous trees? These celebrities in our community are also tall and beautiful and some are more than 100 years old.



These beloved residents of Scottsdale include a stand of **olive trees** that runs down the center of Drinkwater Boulevard and part of Second Street in Old Town Scottsdale. City founder, Winfield Scott, planted them in 1896 to serve as the windbreak for a 40-acre citrus grove.

In the drought of the late 1890s, the orange trees died but the **olive trees** survived and thrived. They are now among the longest-standing landmarks in our city.

Before Scottsdale purchased an artificial Christmas tree, the city would purchase about 70 living **Eldarica pine trees** and place them in a tiered structure to form a living Christmas tree for the city's Holiday Harmony event at the Civic Center. Post season, the trees were planted in our parks -- the lion's share of which were planted along Hayden Road.

If you've driven by Indian School and Miller roads, you have probably noticed a pair of towering **Pistache trees** at Messinger Mortuary. These historic Scottsdale trees were brought here in the 1930s from Iran -- why? To be part of the brand-new Arizona Biltmore Resort. They were left over from the Resort construction and given to a carpenter who worked there. He brought them home and planted them in his yard, which just happens to be where the mortuary stands today.

Sadly, during severe monsoon storms in 2022, one of the stately **Pistache trees** fell – leaving only the single tall tree as a continuing reminder of a little piece of Arizona history.

The last but certainly not least of our famous trees, is right in the heart of Old Town, the **Banyan tree** at the corner of Brown & Main.

Banyan trees, a.k.a. *Ficus benghalensis*, are native to the Indian subcontinent.

Scottsdale's spectacular specimen was planted in September 1996 from a 24" box container. Most people believe that tree is much, much older given its incredible size but we shouldn't be surprised - **Banyan trees** in India are among the largest trees in the world by canopy coverage.

Those are some of Scottsdale's famous trees we love to share their stories and celebrate them, particularly on a day like today.

At last year's Arbor Day event, Scottsdale proudly celebrated its 40th year as part of the Tree City USA program - longer than any other city in Arizona.

This year marks Scottsdale's 41st - while that's not a nice round number like 40, it does mean that our city is entering its fifth consecutive decade as a Tree City USA.

That recognition is evidence of Scottsdale's unwavering commitment to the environment and to sustaining a wonderful quality of life in the community.

## Plant Spotlight | Carol Parrott

Yerba mansa – Anemopsis californica – Lizard Tail family

A stunning native groundcover that grows by rhizomes, thrives in our alkaline soil and only



goes where it gets water. It can be used as an aquatic plant.

In Arizona it can be found growing in riparian areas. Yerba mansa adds elegance to our home ponds and our gardens. Takes full sun or part shade. In spring, stark white cone-shaped flowers emerge from a bed of white bracts. Yerba Mansa is stunning in a night garden.

It has been used for eons by indigenous people to treat respiratory and intestinal ailments. Today, it is in production in the Tucson area.

Tea made from the roots is available at Trader Joe's. Beware, it contains a high amount of caffeine and can interfere with sleep.
