to the valley. If you're a snowbird or a sunbird ... Welcome back, we're glad you're here.

In the summer we live at 8,000' in the middle of the Dixie National Forest, a forest that is stressed from years of drought and rising temperatures. The snow load was low again this winter and offered no relief from the drought.

Upon arrival in Utah this summer, the forest floor was covered with pinecones. They were everywhere, a bumper crop. In 32 years, we never saw anything like it! The U.S. Forest Service explained that healthy trees put their



energy into growth; stressed trees produce an abundance of pinecones hoping to perpetuate their existence and not go extinct!

Is Mother Nature sending us a message? And, if so, what can we do?

Well, we can start by replacing all the beautiful plants we lost over the summer with native or

desert adapted plants, like the Native Fairy Duster pictured here:

This simple act contributes much to our conservation efforts. Native plants use far less water and do not require fertilizers.

Plant of the Month | Jeanne Isbell

Growing Penstemon

Penstemon, often called "beardtongue", is one of my favorite native plants. This wildflower thrives in the desert's



challenging climate, offering vibrant blooms that attract pollinators like bees and hummingbirds. Its drought tolerance and adaptability make it perfect for our low-desert landscape. Here are 5 tips on how to successfully grow penstemon in your home gardens.

- 1. Choose the Right Varieties -Not all penstemon varieties thrive in the low desert. Look for species adapted to hot, dry conditions. My favorites are "Penstemon Parry", Parry's Penstemon which has brilliant pink flowers and is a favorite among pollinators, and "Penstemon eatoni", Firecracker penstemon. Known for its bright red blooms, this species attracts hummingbirds and makes a vibrant addition to the garden.
- 2. Provide Well-Draining Soil Penstemon prefers rocky or sandy, well-drained soil, mimicking its native desert environment. Amend heavy clay soils with coarse sand or organic material to improve drainage, as soggy soil can cause root rot.
- 3. Plant in Full Sun Penstemon needs at least six hours of direct sunlight each day. Full sun encourages abundant flowering and

healthy plants. Ensure your plants are placed where they receive maximum sunlight to thrive in the heat.

- 4. Water Sparingly Once established, penstemon is very drought-tolerant. Water young plants regularly until they are rooted, but after that, reduce watering. During the summer months, deep water once every 10-14 days. Over watering can lead to fungal issues and weak plants.
- 5. Prune After Blooming After penstemon blooms in the spring, cut back the stalks to encourage new growth and prolong blooming. Deadheading also prevents the plants from self-seeding excessively, keeping your garden looking tidy.

By choosing the right varieties and following these tips, you can enjoy the beauty of penstemon in your desert garden year after year.


