#### Plant Spotlight | Aurien Preiss

Blue Salvia, *Salvia farinacea* is a perennial plant with showy purplish blue flower spikes that run up and down the stems. Also known as mealycup sage, the plant is native to North America and part of the Salvia genus.

The leaves of the mealycup sage are shiny,

elongated, and slightly serrated with a hint of gray on the underside.

This hardy perennial has lived in my garden for many years along a flower garden border.

It's approximately 36 inches tall, and despite my neglect has thrived and survived the summer providing blooms for the bees, hummingbirds, and finches.



Fall and Spring is when you'll see it really come to life and deepen its bloom color.



Brave the Wild River
The Untold Story of Two

Women Who Mapped the Botany of THE GRAND CANYON

Brave the Wild River is an exciting account of a 1938 trip through the Grand Canyon by the first women and first botanists to successfully 'run the river'. The women, **Elzada Clover** and **Lois Jotter**, both scientists at the University of Michigan, aimed to collect the flora of the

Canyon and test several botanical theories at the time: whether plants common in all three desert areas which intersect in the canyon lands were present in the Grand Canyon, what different plants would be found in the various elevations of the Canyon, and whether they would find 'relict flora', flora left over from an cooler, wetter environment from eons ago.

Clover's special interest was cacti while Jotter's was the evening primrose. It is fascinating to learn how they collected and prepared the specimens, then pressed them between newspaper pages. And despite the various boating mishaps, the collection apparently survived! The first plant Clover collected was the *Opuntia polyacanta* var. *hystricina* – the Plains prickly pear. How <u>do</u> you prepare this thorny wonder for pressing?

The author, **Melissa L. Sevigny**, is a science journalist at Arizona Public Radio, and a resident of Flagstaff. Her book is not only a riveting tale of surviving the multiple rapids of this formidable river but also a look into the early days of women in scientific careers.

Susan explained the Penny Pines program as the collection container was passed around. Susan took names of those who wanted to order The NGC "Visions of Beauty" calendar and will order if available.

The Membership Report was deferred until November.

Susan Salembier introduced a possible new project with the Scottsdale Library which is archiving SGC's history. She will be meeting with them and reporting back shortly. She also asked for used garden tools, big and small to be used in Mexico, in response to a Sister City request.

Carol announced that our FUNdraiser will be held on March 10, 2024. Judy Shelton has reserved the McDowell Center. Club members brought in 2 bottles of wine, a sampling of olive oils and a historic book from the fifties for our District Meeting basket which Jen Donovan has graciously offered, once again, to design. Judy Shelton announced a plant sale at our November meeting. Members were encouraged to bring in plants, cuttings, seeds, containers, books and any other garden-related items. Evie Campbell asked for prescription or over the counter medications and all types of medical supplies and equipment for the New Birth Mexican Mission project.
