## FIDGET MAT DONATION TO ROCK CREEK SCHOOL



On April 18<sup>th</sup> five members of our guild visited Rock Creek School in Frederick County, MD to donate 31 Fidget Mats to students. It was a donation that the members who attended won't soon forget. About 40-50 students were invited to an assembly and most of the students were assisted by an adult (Special Education Instructional Assistant) who helped them navigate in their wheelchair or other assistive device as they made their way through the gymnasium to us to receive their fidget mat. The excitement and enthusiasm in the room was palpable. Several of the teachers who were there mentioned how incredible this was for their students.

Following our time in the gymnasium with the students, we received a tour of the facility with the school principal. It's a remarkable facility that is well-equipped to serve students with severe intellectual, physical, and emotional learning disabilities.

#### **MEMBERSHIP**

## QUILT SHOW "BARGAIN BIN/SECOND CHANCE STORE"

Shari Wastler and Melinda Horner will be setting up table at the May Guild Meeting to accept signups for Guild Members who are interested in selling their items in the "Bargain Bin" at the August 2023 Quilt Show. Quality items, notions, books, machines, hoops, patterns, fabric, etc. are accepted. Items will be accepted during the set-up hours of the August Quilt Show. All items must be priced and labeled, pinned-on or stapled price tags preferred on fabric. I understand stick-on tags are practical for certain items.



Each participant will be issued an identifier code that must be used in labeling and pricing their items (i.e., ABC). Participants must then add an inventory number (i.e., ABC100). An Inventory Price List (two copies) one for you and one for the Bargain Bin must be submitted. Five percent of each sale will be donated to the Guild. Items can be donated where 100% of the sale will go to the Guild. All funds will be accounted for and the payments will be dispersed to the participants at the September Guild Meeting. A help sheet will be available.

We are quilters who purchase quality fabrics etc. and quality items etc. Non-quality items will not be accepted. All Participants are required to work the Bargain Bin for at least two hours. All items not sold during the show must be picked up by the Seller at the closing of the Quilt Show. Any questions contact Melinda Horner or Shari Wastler.

#### HANGING SLEEVE FOR YOUR QUILT

Do you want to put a hanging sleeve on your quilt? Here is a great video on how to put a hanging sleeve on your quilt when you put on your binding and how to put on a sleeve if your quilt is completed. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ZjPqhTAH-9A

For a 4-inch hanging sleeve (which most shows require) cut an 8 ½ inch by the width of your quilt minus 1-2 inches. Fold both sides in ¼ inch two times, you want to make sure the sleeve is away from your binding. Whichever way you choose to do the sleeve, you then hand sew using a whip stitch to tack down the sides. For the bottom leave ½ inch up from your stitch across to relieve any stress on your quilt. The video will show you this in detail-happy quilting.



#### FALL SOCIAL EVENT

Since we did not have a May Banquet, how about a fall get-together? If you're interested in working with a group of members to plan such an event for a Saturday in the fall, sign up at the May meeting. A planning committee of five or six ladies would work well . . . more help is always welcome. #### **ANNUAL BUDGET**



Please carefully study the proposed budget for fiscal year July 1, 2023–June 30, 2024 that was presented at the April meeting and is attached to this newsletter. There is a sizable difference between our projected revenue versus our expenses. I am concerned about the fiscal soundness of the budget. Especially look at these line items: Challenge Prizes, Community Philanthropy, Program Speakers, Rent for a Storage Unit, Service Project Community Quilts/Batting, and Spring Tea. Linked to the budget are decisions we must make on if/when we will hold another "Quilts in the Park" type event, a Bingo, and a Quilt Show. We should include partial savings in

the budget years that precede those events. There will be some time at the May guild meeting to discuss these points. If they cannot be resolved at the May meeting, I will recommend that approval of the budget be tabled until the June Meeting. Marilyn



# May SCRAPBUSTING

#### YOU WILL NEED:

- 2 5"x 7"" fabrics (1 print, 1 contrasting)
- 1 5"x 7" contrasting print for front pocket
- 1 5"x 7" fusible fleece
- 1 3 1/2"x 5" fusible fleece
- 1. Trace pattern on cardstock or stencil vinyl and cut out to make template.
- Center template 3/8" from bottom on wrong side of lighter 5"x 7" fabric and trace around it with fusion pen. <u>This traced line will be your stitching line.</u> Set fabric aside.
- 2. Press 5"x 7" fusible fleece to wrong side of remaining 5"x 7" print fabric.
- To prepare front pocket: Fold 5"x 7" front pocket piece in half wrong sides together, 5" edges will meet. Finger press center line. Open flat with wrong side up. Place 3 1/2"x 5" fusible fleece, center line to cut edge. Refold fabric to make 3 1/2""x 5" sandwich, right sides facing out, cut edges even. Press and set aside.
- 4. Lay print fabric right side up with a short edge toward top. Place folded front pocket on top with cut edges even at bottom and fold toward center line. Lay 5"x 7" contrasting print face down, making a sandwich matching all cut edges. Your stitching line will be visible on top. Clip or pin to hold.
- 5. Stitch on marked line, leaving opening for turning. Be sure to lock stitching at beginning and end. Trim seam and clip curves, leaving 3/8" fabric at opening for folding in. I used pinking shears for trimming.
- 6. Turn right side out, pocket should be on side with contrasting fabric. Print does not have pocket.
- 7. Tuck 3/8" fabric in opening and press. Top-stitch along straight edge at top to secure opening.
- 8. Fold over top flap to cover pocket and press. A color matched snap will be added at a later date.

#### FCQG Minutes April 11, 2023

A pre-meeting demonstration was presented by Marsha Greenslit. She showed us how to make fascinators to wear to our upcoming tea. Flowers and feathers and tulle, oh my! Thank you, Marsha.

The meeting was called to order by Marilyn Whalen, president. Leslie Cole was the technical advisor for the evening.

There was one visitor. In addition, Barbara Gardner and Judy Puckett, from Milltown Quilters, presented their raffle quilt.

Birthdays were acknowledged and birthday ladies encouraged to take a fat quarter from the birthday box.

Marilyn thanked everyone for their clean-up efforts last month and requested a repeat performance.

Rhonda Madden introduced our guest speaker, Elizabeth Lay. She is curator of textiles at Montgomery Co. Historical Museum. She has worked in many museums worldwide. Her topic was, "The Work of Women's Hands–Maryland Chintz Quilts." Much of her talk involved the evolution of chintz fabric and its use in a prized quilt displayed at the Montgomery Co. Museum.

Before continuing the business meeting, Marilyn made an announcement about the sudden hospitalization of our friend and member Libi Driggers. Cards were circulated for well wishes to Libi. Libi, along with Maureen Dixon, was the coordinator of our charity project,

"Sleep in Heavenly Peace." Much of the donated fabric was at Libi's house, and it has been transferred to Marilyn's house. Members were asked to take a quilt top to finish. Also, there was an abundance of fabric for backing donated by Charlotte's Quilt Shop. Marilyn thanked Sue Richter (owner), and a thank-you card will be sent by Vicki.

#### New Business:

The minutes of the March 2023 meeting were approved. Sue Dieringer-Boyer motioned and Nancy Willet seconded with the minutes being approved by majority vote.

Annette Dietrich gave the Treasurer's Report. The total funds in our PNC account are \$xx,xxx.

Kristi Dillard, co-chairman of the Quilters' Tea Committee, asked for a budget increase of \$xxx for equipment rental of chairs and tables. The increase was approved by majority vote.

**Quilt Show:** Mary Jo Richmond informed the members that there will be a digital sign-up sheet for volunteer slots at the show.
