#### **Editorial:**

There have been advantages, which includes attending talks by leading experts in their field, in my case examples include energy, electric vehicles, and climate change. Organisations that normally organise talks, for 10 to a 12 people in a room in Hobart, find they have an audience of 150 attending from all over Australia via Zoom.

The many interesting talks I normally see advertised in Melbourne come & go without me taking advantage of the opportunity to attend, simply because of the 2 hours each way required in travel time. Now I can sit in my study, for the talk of usually only one hour and be as well informed as I would be if I had attended in person.

Actually, in some ways attending online is better. The platforms like Zoom allow for questions to be submitted during the talks and for sharing of relevant links to papers, reports, etc while the talk is underway.

I appreciate the lack of one on one opportunities that result from attending seminars, workshops, conferences and exhibitions, usually over a coffee during breaks. Although even this is possible and I have experienced having a separate chat with Zoom and a face-to-face coffee with other participants I have met in Zoom meetings.

One interesting innovation for our Club was our recent idea of inviting a 'Zoom buddy' in to homes of Zoom proficient members to overcome the problem of some members not having a computer.

On the down side of course, a Zoom meeting will never be a substitute for the more social aspects of a group of people like our club.

The COVID19 pandemic has created havoc around the world, especially in countries which prefer to ignore it, rather than lock-down as Australia has done.

Zoom has overcome many of the problems of distance for those in the business world by enabling people in various locations to attend meetings without having to spend time travelling.

Likewise the risk of spreading COVID19 has meant much less time spent travelling, especially by air.

On the whole Zoom has been a reasonable substitute for communication among us

# What Peter Searle has been doing while in isolation

He began with long deferred jobs around the garden - replacing damaged/worn wooden garden edges, re-doing a section of brick paving that had subsided, building a frame for next summer's strawberry crop etc. After the weather began to get colder indoor pursuits began to dominate. He signed up to two online courses at University of Tasmania. Understanding Dementia followed by Preventing Dementia. Why? Because he had some time available due to the restrictions, he hadn't tried an online course before and because he didn't know much about dementia, thought it could be a useful way of learning about it. It was. Although popular with some during isolation, Peter refrained from tidying up the shed. He argued that he knows where everything is, and if he tidied up and re-arranged things he wouldn't be able to find anything easily for the next 10 years or so. Besides, there is a lot of stuff stored in his shed that hasn't found a use vet.

As Secretary of Bendigo Orienteers he has been involved in navigating the 'return to sport' Government guidelines to ensure a safe return to competition. If there is one sport where social distancing is an integral part of the competition it is orienteering! People race off by themselves at three-minute intervals, should not follow anyone and an hour or so later – hopefully – reappear again. Our Y Service Club meetings are constrained by the 4 square metre rule with a 17 person maximum in the meeting room. Presently, a 20 person maximum applies to an orienteering competition conducted over 100 acres or so of bushland!! Go figure.

# What Colin Lambie has been doing while in isolation

COVID19 has not made a great difference to the 'work' I do. I do not spend time in the Bendigo Sustainability Group office as I normally do, but the work I do can be done anywhere, as long as I have a computer and the Internet.

I have stopped the monthly public information sessions about solar & batteries at the Library. Some people have still made contact, so I am able to provide advice by phone and email.

The main project I have worked on for last 3 years has been to establish community owned solar rooftop projects. We had reached the point where we had a number of potential hosts for community owned solar projects, but COVID19 put a stop to most.

I am still hopeful that a grant to install solar & a battery at Maiden Gully Fire Brigade will happen.

More recently I have put together a grant application to install 20 to 30kW on 5 community buildings and 3kW on each of the 25 social housing homes at Sidney Myer Haven in Flora Hill. This project will require crowd funding (fund raising) of some of the cost of each solar system.

One of the sites included in the grant application is Lightning Reef Early Learning Centre, which is run by the YMCA.

The other sites are: the Bendigo Golf Club at Epsom; Barrack Reserve at Heathcote and two Access Australia buildings.

Another interest I started this year is with U3A (University of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Age). I joined a discussion group, which was meeting in a room at Kangaroo Flat. I got to one meeting and then COVID19 stopped face-to-face meetings. I had been introduced to Zoom shortly after the U3A group shut down, so I suggested they meet on Zoom. Like our club, not all have a computer or the skill to use Zoom, but those that did have appreciated the continuation of meetings.

I am also part of local ABC Friends and have proposed use of Zoom for gatherings of ABC supporters. Our first event will be a talk by local ABC rep, Sian Gard, the Station Manager. Sian and many participants will be on Zoom; some participants will be attending together in a room (the room used by our club) at the Strathdale Community Centre. This event is at 5pm on Wed 8 July 2020.

#### **Recent Program Highlights**
