Despite e-mails to the distribution manager of our International Magazine, there has been no result. It would appear that, in the big picture, our Club with only a few members has been forgotten, or the distribution manager is ignoring our request. I will keep trying!!

Is Your Home Safe?

It has been decided that, due to my chronic balance problems, our home needed assessment by a professional Occupational Therapist.

I agreed that the inspection go ahead, as I felt that a house on a flat block of land, with paved and concreted areas outside, was as good as needed. How wrong can you be !!

After the OT's inspection, I found that there were many areas to be rectified "to bring our house up to standard".

<u>I have three, four-wheeler walking frames – One in our car, one in our house and one for outdoor use. The outdoor model needed the brake cables adjusted (done) and the others passed her inspection.</u>

The step outside to our back patio needs a platform at the step height and a ramp (1 – 14 is the recognised gradient) to allow stability when exiting.

The step up from the garage into the house needs a platform and ramp (! – 14) for stable egress. These platforms and ramps need to be sturdy and weight bearing. My drinks fridge in the garage may have to live in the corner of this

platform, to allow the ramp to be positioned correctly.

The front doorstep needs an additional piece of timber to create a larger, flatter surface, for better stability entering and leaving.

One toilet has a grip rail, which passed inspection, but the toilet wall in our en-suite needs a similar rail.

The en-suite shower base required treatment to make it non slippery. This now has a plastic, multi suction cup mat which works well. There was already a grip rail fitted, which passed muster.

The laundry sliding door, with a step to the outside, is off limits as I will have to use the ramped, platform fitted doors, to exit the house.

My shed passed, despite the lady's dislike of power tools, etc. It was agreed that the shed was tidy with clear access to the tools and exit doors.

Of course, there are other rules.

- No use of ladders allowed.
- No trying to carry too many garden items.
- No lifting of heavy articles trolley must be used each time.
- No sudden movements. Getting out of bed or an easy chair to be slow and deliberate to allow blood pressure to stabilise.
- Sturdy flat soled, preferably rubber soled, footwear...

And, the list goes on for about two A4 sheets.

I must agree this is all in my best interests, but one does feel their independence being eroded. This feeling is probably a "man thing", or is that another word for "pride"?

The icing was on the cake when his batting partner also reached his "ton". Mathew Wade, absent from Test Cricket for about 6 ½ years was called up and he certainly did not let the side down. Well done to both of them!!
