



#### 100 MILE FESTIVAL OF THE ARTS MISSION STATEMENT

To promote the cultivation of music and the performing arts in their various forms as a pleasing and beneficial auxiliary to community life in 100 Mile House and the surrounding areas.

#### **B.C. PROVINCIAL COMPETITIONS**

100 Mile Festival of the Arts is a member of Performing Arts B.C. and 100 Mile and District Arts Council. Our adjudicators may recommend competitors at the Junior, Intermediate and Senior levels of each discipline to compete at the Provincial Competitions organized by Performing Arts B.C. The ultimate selection of competitors and merited participants is the sole responsibility of the adjudicators who are briefed and knowledgeable of provincial standards and requirements. Adjudicators have the interests of the students in mind when they do not recommend participants to compete in a discipline despite the existence of qualifying marks.

On the written recommendation of the adjudicator, each local festival may send to the Provincial competition one participant at each level of each discipline. The participant must have received a mark of 85% or over in all selections to be performed at the Provincial level. The adjudicator may also select certain students to attend as merited participants.

Chosen participants are urged to attend the provincial competition for the experience of listening and learning, even if they feel they have no chance of winning. Remember: winning is not the goal in any festival—the objective is to pace one another on the road to excellence.

Performing Arts BC will organize and conduct the 2025 Provincial Competition in Victoria, BC from June 1<sup>st</sup> to 5<sup>th</sup>. For more information and to view the syllabus for the Provincial Performing Arts Festival visit their website at *www.performingartsbc.ca*.

It is the responsibility of each Provincial Festival entrant to read and comply with all rules governing the Provincial Festival.

#### **CERTIFICATES**

Marks are not announced after each performance however, participants receive a certificate for each class entered. Certificates are awarded based on the following adjudication "marks":

90% & higher	Platinum Certificate
85% - 89%	<b>Gold Certificate</b>
80% - 84%	Silver Certificate
79% & lower	Bronze Certificate

#### **AWARDS**

All awards are chosen by the adjudicators. The Festival Committee reserves the right to withhold any award in any year if, in the opinion of the adjudicator, a suitable standard has not been attained. From the pool of all award winners, the adjudicators select performers and performances for the Awards and Showcase Concert. For this celebration, consideration of content appropriate for a general audience may be applied. Awards and their sponsors are subject to change from year to year. Awards sponsored by the 100 Mile Festival of the Arts are available to be sponsored privately. To enquire about sponsoring an award, please contact the Festival Committee. Terry holds her ARCT in voice and piano and has been teaching for over 50 years. She took her advanced studies with mezzo soprano Phyllis Mailing and piano with Edward Parker.

Her students have won countless top awards at local and Provincial festivals. The Logan Studio has won over 20 Provincial Conservatory Gold medals for excellence in practical exams from grade 1 to ARCT.

Choral music is her passion. As a teenager, Terry formed her first youth choir and also sang in the Vancouver Cantata Singers under James Fankhauser. Her last youth choir, Chantant, won numerous

local and provincial awards as well as being recommended to the National level. She has given choral and vocal workshops around the province.

Terry has been a soloist with the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra and has sung many operatic roles with the Kelowna Opera. Among them, Adele in Die Fledermaus, Marcellina in The Marriage of Figaro and Papagena in The Magic Flute. She has been the conductor of the Aura Chamber Choir and the Vernon Community Singers and currently conducts the Ancora Women's Ensemble and the Melodia Singers.
