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The Eastern Disability Housing Network (EDHN) has developed a three-year strategic plan to support its members and stakeholders in their goal to secure appropriate and affordable housing for adults with disabilities.

This plan was developed from:

- a planning workshop with EDHN members
- survey responses from EDHN members
- feedback from EDHN members including the EDHN Steering Committee.

Background, challenges & changes:

The Eastern Disability Housing Network (EDHN) was set up in 2014. It is supported by Knox City Council, through its MetroAccess officer Peter Johnston, and Araluen Housing Services through its manager Jenny Tomlin (formerly Harrisons Uniting Care).

As it enters its fifth year, the EDHN has reviewed its impact and relevance to members of the network and identified the following challenges and goals:

- keeping the EDHN vibrant, useful and alive
- attracting new members and meeting the needs of members
- supporting carers who may be exhausted, isolated and already over-committed
- forming strong links with the business, corporate and philanthropic sectors
- collaborating with other councils, disability housing organisations and networks
- strengthening its advocacy impact (at local level, and local, state and federal government level)
- applying for project and capacity building grants to secure and extend its scope.

In 2020, the Victorian Government-funded MetroAccess program is expected to end. Knox City Council and Araluen Housing Services have committed to the ongoing support of the EDHN.
