The Heights Charter operates one resource center where each student has an individualized study program with the benefits of optional onsite academic and learning labs. Onsite learning activities provide opportunities for socialization, academic enrichment, and teacher support not usually available in a standard independent study program. The program customizes the learning experience to each student's needs and interests so they learn right at the edge of challenge, minimizing frustration and boredom, and optimizing student engagement time. Consequently, students typically excel as well as develop a love of learning. The Heights Charter embraces the opportunity to provide a dynamic, individualized learning experience to a student population that has increasingly fallen through the educational 'cracks' in previous learning environments.

## School Mission
