Respect, Discipline, and Heart: SAPS Youth Urged to Lead Right

WALKERVILLE – A wave of pride and purpose swept through Lapeng Hotel on Friday, 27 June 2025, as young Constables from across Gauteng gathered under the theme

“Youth at Heart: Building a Better SAPS.” Hosted by the Sedibeng Women’s Network and Men for Change, the event focused on preparing junior members of the South African Police Service to lead with discipline, integrity, and emotional intelligence.

The day tackled pressing issues such as police discipline, anti-corruption, gender-based violence, and mental wellness — all vital elements in strengthening the SAPS from within.

The initiative aimed to equip young Constables with the knowledge and tools needed to serve communities with pride and professionalism.

Delivering the keynote address, Major General Anna Sithole, Ekurhuleni District Commissioner and SAPS Provincial Women’s Network Champion, made a powerful appeal to the SAPS youth:

“Police officers must respect one another — regardless of age or education. No one is above instruction. If your commander gives you a lawful order, follow it.”

She addressed one of the root causes of internal corruption, urging officers to avoid materialistic competition:

“Stop competing with each other over cars, clothes, or lifestyle. That kind of pressure leads to greed and corruption. If you ever find yourself in a situation that could lead to criminal conduct — walk away.”

Major General Sithole firmly reminded the young officers of their duty:

“We cannot be the ones suspected of GBV, hijackings, or house robberies. We are here to enforce the law — not to break it.”

As the day concluded, the message was unmistakable: SAPS youth must carry the organisation forward with courage, character, and commitment. The future of policing in South Africa depends on their integrity — and their willingness to lead with heart.

Memorial Walk for 2 Years old Kutlwano Shalaba Held in Boipatong

Memorial Walk for Kutlwano Held in BOIPATONG, GAUTENG – On Friday, 27 June 2025, a peaceful yet emotionally charged memorial walk was held in remembrance of 2-year-old Kutlwano Shalaba, the toddler who went missing in November 2024 and was later found dead under horrific circumstances.

According to Boipatong Police Spokesperson Constable Selina Mthimkulu, the event began at the Boipatong Monument and ended at Boipatong Place of Care Creche in Tugela, where a memorial service took place.

The day was led by Constable Agnes Ntuthu, the Domestic Violence Coordinator at Boipatong SAPS, alongside her team from the SAPS Trauma Centre.

The gathering was supported by various stakeholders including SAPS management, GTW, gender-based violence brigades, CPF, Community Safety, local priests, patrollers, and the broader community.

The purpose was to promote healing and unity while reaffirming SAPS's commitment to bringing perpetrators of violence—especially against children—to justice.

Candles were lit to honour Kutlwano's memory, and local priests offered prayers and words of comfort drawn from Scripture.

The service concluded with the presentation of portrait photographs of Kutlwano to her grieving family. Two suspects have been arrested:

Keneilwe Shalaba (33), the toddler's mother, is charged with: the police

Premeditated murder
Human trafficking
Conspiracy to commit robbery
Defeating the ends of justice
Lying to police

She was denied bail during her appearance in February 2025 and remains in custody. Sebokoana Khoanyana (50), a traditional healer (sangoma), was arrested on 29 May 2025. He reportedly led police to a shallow grave along Waterpan Road in Bekkersdal where skeletal remains—believed to be Kutlwano's—were found.

He is facing charges of:
Premeditated murder
Human trafficking
Defeating the ends of justice
Investigators suspect the toddler was poisoned, based on Khoanyana's initial statements. Post-mortem and DNA results are pending to conclusively confirm the identity and cause of death.

Both suspects last appeared at Vanderbijlpark Magistrate's Court on Wednesday, 25 June 2025. Their next court date is scheduled for Wednesday, 6 August 2025. Speaking to Rea Gazette, Constable Mthimkulu stated:

“The SAPS works tirelessly to bring perpetrators of such inhumane crimes to justice. No child should suffer such a fate, and no community should have to mourn like this. We are committed to closing this case with dignity and truth.”

While justice takes its course, Boipatong's residents, faith leaders, and public safety structures remain united in grief—and in resolve. “This was not just a walk for Kutlwano, but a call to protect every child in our township,” said one community leader.

Tragic Crash on Golden Highway Claims Life of Motorbike Passenger

SEBOKENG – June 17, 2025
A devastating accident on the Golden Highway has left the Sebokeng community in mourning after a 45-year-old African female tragically lost her life in a collision involving a motor vehicle and a motorbike.

The incident occurred on the evening of Tuesday, 17 June 2025. It is alleged that both the motor vehicle and motorbike were travelling north when the vehicle collided with the motorbike, which reportedly had no tail lights. The impact caused both vehicles to overturn.

All three individuals involved — the driver of the car, the motorbike rider, and his wife (the passenger) — sustained serious injuries. They were transported to Sebokeng Hospital for medical attention. Unfortunately, the female passenger succumbed to her injuries and was later declared deceased. The motor vehicle driver, who suffered a head injury, declined medical treatment at the scene.

Sebokeng SAPS spokesperson Sergeant Nthabiseng Mokhachane confirmed that a case of culpable homicide has been opened.

“The investigation is ongoing. We urge anyone who may have witnessed the accident or who has information that could assist the investigation to come forward,” said Sergeant Mokhachane.

Station Commander Brigadier Thembekile Kubone expressed condolences to the family and took the opportunity to remind road users about safety. “We urge motorists to always remain vigilant when driving at night and ensure their vehicles are roadworthy.

Passengers, especially on motorcycles, should wear reflective or light-coloured clothing to improve visibility,” Brigadier Kubone advised.

Dunyiswa is described as short in height and dark in complexion. Her unexplained absence has left family members deeply worried, and police are urging the public to assist in locating her.

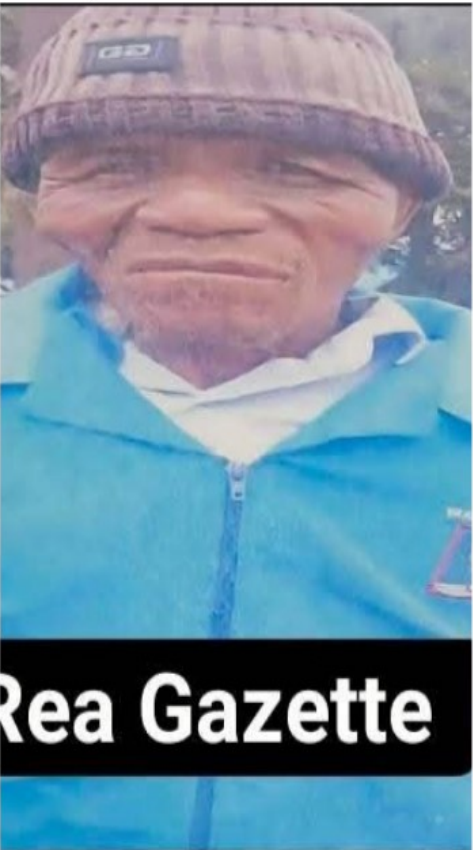
30-Year-Old Johannes Moloi Missing, Sharpeville Police Appeal for Help

Police in Sharpeville are urgently appealing to the public for help in locating Mr. Johannes Doctor Moloi, who has been missing since the morning of Sunday, 15 June 2025. He was last seen around 08:00 at his residence in Tshepiso Phase 01, Sharpeville, and has not returned home.
According to Sharpeville police spokesperson, Constable Busisiwe Sango, Mr. Moloi is approximately 30 years old and is originally from Sasolburg. His disappearance has left his family deeply distressed, and concerns for his safety are growing with each passing day.
“We urge anyone who may have seen Mr. Moloi or who has any relevant information to please come forward. Every detail can help,” said Constable Sango.

He was accompanied by his caregiver from the Vaal Ecos Old Age Home but reportedly wandered off and did not return.
At the time of his disappearance, Mr. Nkwenkwezi was dressed in a black coat, a green reflector vest with his name printed on the chest, grey tracksuit trousers, and a blue beanie. He is described as light in complexion and may appear disoriented.

Sharpeville police have opened a missing person inquiry and are asking anyone with information to come forward immediately to assist with the search efforts. Young Woman Goes Missing in Sebokeng

Sebokeng police are requesting public assistance in locating 25-year-old Lesisitheho Mongalo, who was reported missing by family members after she vanished from Sebokeng on 31 August 2024.
According to her family, Lesisitheho's mother in Lesotho received a message from her husband stating that she had left home with her belongings and drove off in an unknown vehicle to an undisclosed location. She has not been seen since.
On 4 January 2025, the family was contacted by a woman who claimed to have crucial information about what happened to Lesisitheho. Two days later, however, the same woman retracted her claims, leaving the family frustrated and anxious.
It was later confirmed that Lesisitheho's husband had also opened a missing person case with local authorities.

Sgt Mwale’s Tireless Work Jails Sebokeng Rapist for 10 Years

SEBOKENG – Justice has prevailed thanks to the relentless efforts of Sergeant Mwale from the FCS Unit (Family Violence, Child Protection and Sexual Offences), who ensured the successful conviction of a 36-year-old rapist in Sebokeng.

Thabiso Metsing, 36, was sentenced to 10 years’ direct imprisonment by the Sebokeng Magistrate’s Court and declared unfit to possess a firearm, following the rape of a woman near Zone 7 Stadium.

The incident occurred on 10 September 2023. The victim had been at a local tavern with a friend. While preparing to leave, she encountered Metsing—whom she knew. He asked her to walk with him to buy cigarettes. She agreed.

However, instead of heading to a shop, he led her to a nearby veld, threatened her, forced her to undress, and raped her. After the assault, Metsing reportedly fell asleep. The victim fled and sought help at nearby homes. A concerned resident helped her and took her to the police station.



Metsing was arrested the next day, 11 September 2023. Sgt Mwale immediately took charge of the investigation, ensuring a thorough case presentation in court. “Thanks to the dedication and professionalism of Sergeant Mwale, justice was served and a dangerous offender is now behind bars,” said Evaton police spokesperson Constable Thulisile Msibi.

She commended the victim’s bravery and urged GBV survivors to speak out. “Help is available. Perpetrators will face the full might of the law,” she added. Between January and March 2025, SAPS recorded over 10,500 rape cases, with many victims attacked by someone they knew. Gauteng remains one of the hardest-hit provinces, with areas like Sebokeng often topping the list.

Despite the high numbers, progress is being made. From April 2024 to March 2025, the FCS Unit secured over 600 convictions for sexual offences, thanks to dedicated investigators and survivor cooperation. SAPS DRIVES CHANGE WITH SELF-FUNDED GBV SOUP CAMPAIGN

SEBOKENG – On 2 July 2025, Sebokeng SAPS, in partnership with MASP, Indibano, GBV Brigades, and Thetha FM (The Morning Breakfast Show), hosted the second annual GBV soup drive at Azania, Sebokeng. Day 2 followed at Boiketlong Grounds.

This outreach initiative serves a dual purpose: giving back to the community and raising awareness around gender-based violence (GBV), substance abuse, and crime prevention. The event featured Sebokeng Station Commander, Brigadier Thembekile Kubone, personally dishing up soup to children and residents.

The soup drive was initiated in June 2024 by Sergeant Nthabiseng Mokhachane,

Sebokeng SAPS Spokesperson. It remains entirely self-funded, relying on her personal commitment to inspiring others to uplift their communities. “It’s about being present, showing care, and reminding our people that SAPS is here to serve and protect – beyond just policing,” said Mokhachane. The public was encouraged to report all forms of GBV or related crimes at Sebokeng SAPS or directly to the Station Commander.

The drive will continue until 9 July 2025, with future locations unannounced until the day of delivery to avoid overcrowding. Community members are urged to bring containers, especially for elderly persons who may not attend in person. Brigadier Kubone extended her heartfelt thanks: “We appreciate all partners and the warm reception from the Azania community. These small efforts bring real healing.”



POLICE CRACK DOWN ON UNSAFE FOOD AND ILLEGAL ACTIVITY

DE DEUR – On Tuesday, 2025-06-10, the South African Police Service, in collaboration with the Emfuleni Health Department, Gauteng Traffic Wardens, and Siyabangena Patrollers, conducted an illicit food operation in the De Deur policing precincts.

The main objective was to inspect local shops and ensure compliance with health and safety regulations. A total of 17 shops were inspected in Roshnee. Of those, four non-compliance fines were issued to shop owners for breaching outlined food safety standards.

Unlabeled food items with an estimated value of R15,000 were condemned, confiscated, and disposed of with the help of the Emfuleni Local Municipality Waste Department from the Vereeniging Depot.

As operations intensified visibility, police arrested two suspects for possession of illicit drugs, two for being undocumented, and two others for the unlawful use of another person’s property. These secondary arrests underscore how operations of this nature help tackle broader criminal activity.

De Deur Police spokesperson Constable Mampho Mahlomola said that officers often face resistance from non-compliant business owners who operate under unsafe and illegal conditions.

“Some shops sell expired or unlabelled goods that pose serious health risks. These products can cause food poisoning, allergic reactions, and long-term illness,” she warned.

Consumers are reminded that they have a right to safe, properly labeled food. “Every person has the right to know what they’re consuming,” Mahlomola added. “If a product has no label or expiry date, it should not be on the shelf.”

Lieutenant Colonel Anver Hammond, overall commander of the operation, praised the success of the multi-agency collaboration. “We want to ensure that communities are only sold safe, consumable goods. Public health must come first.”

The police have vowed to continue conducting similar operations to protect communities and raise awareness on consumer rights, safety, and accountability.

Illicit food sales remain a serious challenge in South Africa, especially in low-income communities where unregulated spaza shops often sell expired, counterfeit, or unlabelled products.

These goods pose significant health risks and undermine consumer rights. Authorities urge the public to report any suspicious food products or unsafe shop practices to the Department of Health’s Food Control Directorate at 012 395 8804 or call Crime Stop on 08600 10111

South Africa is in mourning following the passing of former Deputy President David Mabuza, who died peacefully at his Mpumalanga home on Monday morning. He was 64.

Affectionately known as “The Cat” for his elusive and quiet political style, Mabuza served as the country’s Deputy President from 2018 to 2023 under President Cyril Ramaphosa. He was also the former Premier of Mpumalanga and a long-serving member of the ANC’s top leadership.

President Ramaphosa described Mabuza as “a humble leader, a strategist, and a servant of the people.” Tributes have poured in from across the political spectrum, recognizing his contribution to democracy, rural development, and land reform.

Born in 1960 in Barberton, Mpumalanga, Mabuza began his career as a teacher and activist before rising through ANC ranks.

Though his tenure was marked by both loyalty and controversy, he remained a key figure in balancing internal party dynamics.

His death comes as a shock to many who viewed him as a quiet force behind major decisions. Funeral arrangements are under way, with the presidency confirming a category one official funeral will be held in Mbombela this coming Sunday.

As the nation lowers its flags in mourning, South Africans reflect on Mabuza’s legacy—a complex yet undeniably impactful chapter in the country’s political journey.

R250,000 Worth of Jewellery Stolen in Riverstone Mall Heist – Police Release Images of Suspects

Meyerton police have launched a full investigation after gold jewellery worth more than R250,000 was stolen from a jewellery store at Riverstone Mall on Tuesday, 3 June 2025.

According to Meyerton SAPS spokesperson Constable Nompumelelo Zazini, the theft occurred between 14:00 and 15:30 and involved three suspects – two African women and one African man – who posed as customers.

"Initially, the suspects entered the store pretending to be interested in rings and watch accessories. They then asked whether the jeweller could fit a strap onto a specific watch, and after receiving confirmation, they left the store," said Constable Zazini.

The same suspects returned later that day. One of the women requested an engraved disc, and the jeweller moved to the back workshop to complete the task. "While the jeweller was busy engraving, the other two suspects pretended to fetch the watch. One of the store employees opened the door for them, and they left," she explained.

After the disc was completed and handed to the remaining female suspect, she paid R600 and also left the store. It was only after approximately 30 minutes that an employee noticed a display showcase had been left open.

"Upon checking, the store owner discovered that a box containing gold necklaces and bracelets had gone missing. The estimated value of the stolen jewellery is over R250,000," said Zazini.

CCTV footage retrieved from the store shows the male suspect and one of the women removing the jewellery box and placing it into a handbag before exiting. The trio was later seen leaving Riverstone Mall in a white Ford Icon with registration number MT200TMGP.

Police have obtained clear images of the suspects from surveillance footage. These will be circulated to assist in identifying the individuals involved.

"We urge anyone who recognises the suspects or who may have information that could assist in the investigation to come forward," added Zazini.

Growing up in Bophelong Ext 18 has played a significant role in shaping Ntsala's writing. "My background has played a crucial role in fueling me to write this book and be passionate because the youth of where I come from is overlooked and scandalized particularly due to some bad choices of the hood," he noted.

Despite facing challenges, including uncertainty about finding a publisher and paying for services, Ntsala persevered with hope and faith.

"The most challenging part about writing the book was wondering if I'll even find a publisher but I just wrote with hope," he shared. "I also wondered if I'd be able to pay but by the Grace of God I was."

Through his book, Ntsala hopes readers will learn to comprehend themselves and understand the interdependence of courage and fear, most importantly to keep moving regardless of the fear or hurt. "It's better to bleed towards the hospital than bleed at one place till you die", said Ntsala.

Ntsala plans to host a book launch in his community in September, which aligns with his values of hope and faith. As a young author, he's already making waves, and his message is resonating with readers.

To aspiring writers from his community, Ntsala offers words of wisdom: "To not undermine themselves and stop worrying about the stages they haven't reached. It is better to deal with things step by step."

Ntsala's love for writing began in 2019 when he developed a passion for music. This debut book marks the beginning of his literary journey.

Constable Tshepo Motaung from Klipdrift: "SAPS has programs to help us cope, and that matters. Support systems make the job more manageable."

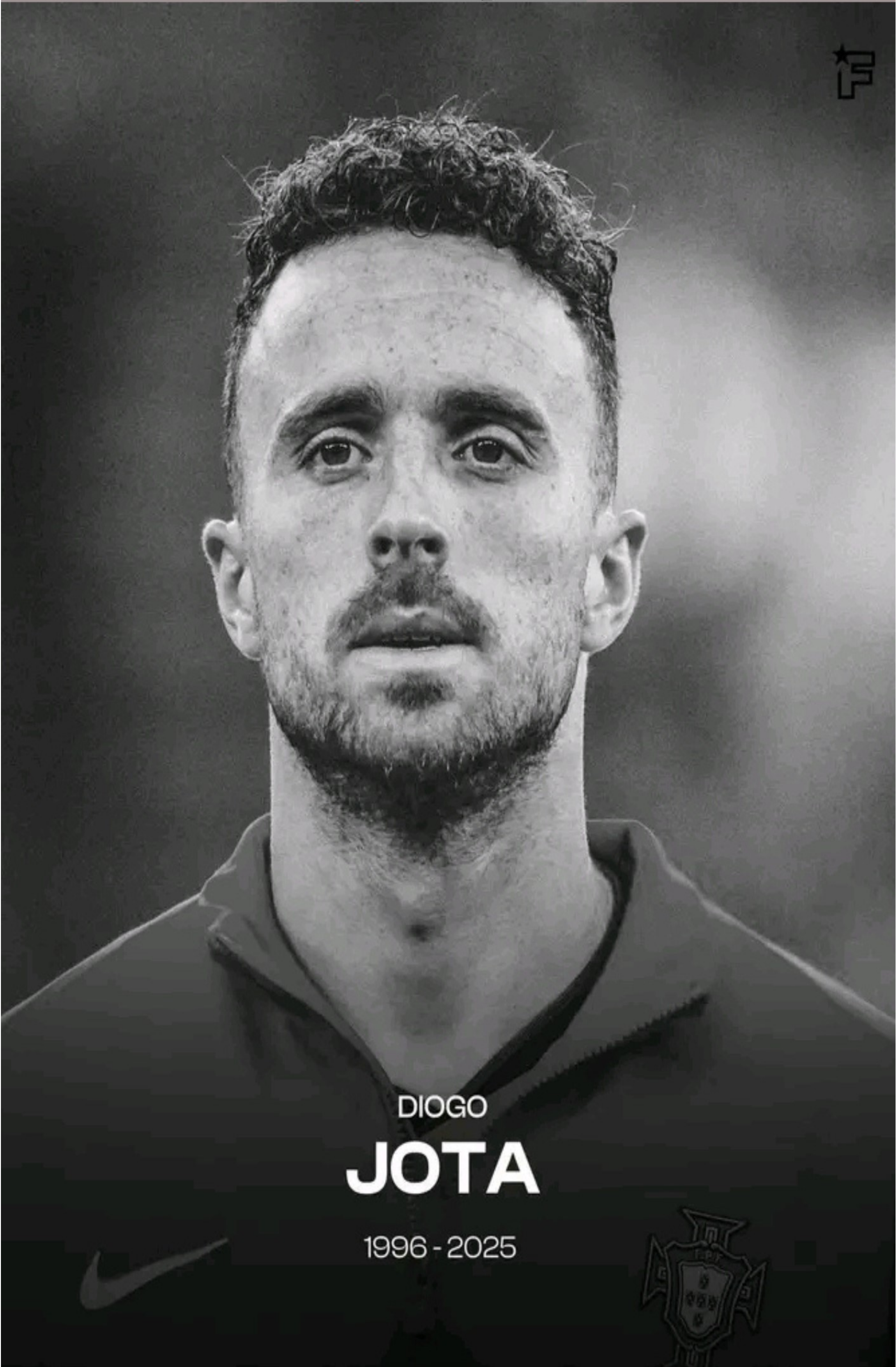
