

THE EMIGRATION OF CLAUS OBLINGER

In 1724 Claus (Nicholas) Oblinger, or Uplinger, age about forty, left Schwartzenau, Germany, a village northwest of Marburg, in County of Wittgenstein, with his wife, Katrina, and five children, Nicholas, Christian, Catharina, Maria, and Anna. He had come to Schwartzenau about 1719, evidently from Baden, as a German Baptist Brethren (Dunkard) refugee.

After an unusually stormy voyage of about ten weeks that included three weeks of delay in England, their ship reached Philadelphia, Pa., Sunday, Oct. 1, 1724. It was not to a friendless land they came, for at Germantown were the Rev. Peter Becker, first Elder of the Brethren Church in America, and other Dunkards who had left Schwartzenau in 1719. It is probable that Claus and his family found their first place of rest at Germantown.

By 1727 Claus was a resident of Franconia township, Montgomery County, Pa., but it was not until Nov. 13, 1729 that he purchased a farm of 182 acres, situated mostly in Franconia township, partly in Lower Salford township, between Souderton and Harleysville, Pa.

Now settled in a land of peace and promise, with the oppressions of his native land, the terrors of the Atlantic Ocean, and the task of homeseeking behind him, his hard earned content was not to be for long. Within a year, the latter part of 1730, he sickened unto death. On Dec. 6, 1739 the farm was sold by his executors in a will dated Aug. 3, 1730 and probated Oct. 3, 1730. Evidently all his children were minors at his death.

He was the first person buried in the old Harley burying ground, at Klein's Brethren Meetinghouse, built in 1843 near Souderton. The burial ground was part of Claus' farm. No tombstone marks his grave. Within a few years most of the family migrated frontierward.
