200 YEARS AGO

By 1755, Nicholas Oblinger—eldest son of Claus Oblinger—was settled for four years at Lehigh Gap. His family consisted of wife, three sons, two daughters and sister, Anna. Here he had built a house surrounded by a stockade and induced an old, friendly Indian to live with him. When the French and Indian War broke out, he was not attacked, although the settlers at Gnaden-huetten (Weissport) were massacred Nov. 24, 1755 and on Jan. 1, 1756 fourteen soldiers were ambushed and killed there.

A few weeks later a detachment of militia, with Benjamin Franklin as colonel, moved north from Bethlehem to build Fort Allen at Weissport. In his Autobiography, Franklin describes marching through rain until arriving at the house of a German at Lehigh Gap, where, in the barn, "we were all huddled together, as wet as water could make us." In a personal letter to Governor Morris, dated Jan. 25, 1756, Franklin indentifies the place as "Uplinger's"

and reports "good quarters."

As Franklin shared the general arrogance of the English majority toward the Pennsylvania Germans, and Nicholas Oblinger probably spoke little or no English, this visit was purely one of convenience and inconvenience. To Franklin it meant shelter from the winter weather and safety from surprise attack by Indians. To Nicholas Oblinger it meant the incursion of a milling mass of undisciplined soldiery, but the added protection of these and the fort soon to be built but a few miles away. Both arrival and departure probably were pleasant to both parties.

As late as June, 1756 militia were stationed at Nicholas Oblinger's home at Lehigh Gap; and it may be considered to have been a part of the line of reserves and communications between Fort Allen and Bethlehem. Therefore, although Nicholas Oblinger took no active part in the fighting so far as is known, he and his fortress-home contributed to repelling the wave of Lenni-Lenape raiders who made the French and Indian War hideous to the German settlers of the

frontier.
