JUST A PIECE OF PAPER

The collection of early family papers in the possession of the Oplinger family historian includes the Revolutionary War pass given to Samuel Oblinger that is on display in the Park and reproduced above. This 183 years old relic raises the question as to what parts were played in that struggle by the three sons of Nicholas Oblinger. It appears that the father, too old for active service, took the oath of allegiance to the State of Pennsylvania and therefore was a Revolutionary patriot.

The son, Isaac, took the oath of allegiance and served as a private in the Northampton County militia from 1778, if not earlier, to 1783. As he was already married and had a family when the war broke out, it is probable that this service was intermittent.

The son, Samuel, who is recorded to have had brown hair and eyes, a long face, and but five feet, four inches tall, had been a Ranger on the Frontier in the War of 1763. In the Revolutionary War he took the oath of allegiance, was a private in the militia, a Ranger on the Frontier, and a soldier of the Continental Line. He died a year after the end of the War.

The son, Nicholas, in 1776 was a private in the Flying Camp of 10,000 men raised for the new Army. He also took the oath of allegiance, was a private in the militia, a Ranger on the Frontier, and is listed as a soldier of the Continental Line. Since his Ranger service was as a substitute for another person, he evidently had no aversion to being a soldier!

The above facts are recorded in the official Pennsylvania Archives. It is strange that no stories of these military adventures were handed down verbally, or otherwise, in the family. As the father and grandfather of the three brothers had come to Pennsylvania to escape war and oppression, it is probable that—with the war past—they dismissed it from their minds and turned their thoughts to the New Future which their efforts had helped to create,
