



CAMPBILL AGUALINDA is a sustainable environment where people with special needs receive aid in learning to live an independent life. It is a place where we enjoy everyday life together, learning the joy of serving others and a love for all. We are a community where everyone is treated as family.

**What are the rights of an adult with special needs that we have violated?**

We have accepted the paternalistic politics of welfare and discrimination against those with special needs for too long.

Most nations have agreed to follow the regulations required by the United Nations regarding the rights of people with special needs. Therefore, I do not need to generate these guidelines on my own; we already have a clear and concise path to follow to create equal opportunity for those with special needs.

In the document "Deinstitutionalization and community life", by International Association for the Scientific Study of Intellectual Disabilities (IASSID), the necessity of deinstitutionalization of adults with special needs is emphasized. It notes that this population should be provided with a model of how to live a more independent life within a community.

The objective of how to live independently is to let those with special needs live similarly to the rest of the population, with fitting accommodations, coexistence, and quality of life. While at the same time helping the residence on how to participate as average citizens in social, cultural, and economic activities.

The use of the word community reflects the importance attributed to the acceptance and help of friends, family, neighbors, volunteers, and colleagues. This acceptance helps to sustain each person with special needs through various supportive relationships that aren't based on economic gains.

CAMPBILL AGUALINDA is proposing a change to our culture, a shift in our way of thinking. Intellectual disabilities are not a health issue and should not be treated as such. It is a matter of human rights and civil law that these people be treated with equality; the issue does not lie with those who have special needs, rather with the social barriers that have been imposed by society.

**To understand this idea better, imagine...**

You cannot leave your parents' house as long as they are alive, and once they have passed on, you are sent to an institution where you are treated as if you were mentally insane! I invite you to think about the time when you reached that age where you parents told you that you were old enough and wise enough that you could act and think on your own, where you could be your own person.

Now imagine that no one ever told you that, or let you think you were grown, where everyone still treated you as a child. You watched your brothers and sisters grow up and live their lives, while you stayed stuck in time – always performing the same elementary activities. Imagine the anguish of your aging parents, not knowing who will take you in when they are gone - your little brother perhaps? Will you be alone in an apartment? Or will you have to be institutionalized? Or worse, you wake up one day and they tell you, your parents have both died, no one is here for you; there is nothing we can do. And at age 45, your life ends as you knew because you have no community or family at your side.



The idea behind CAMP HILL AGUALINDA is really to help support those with special needs in realizing their rights as human beings, the right to grow up and learn, the right to become independent and make decisions on their own.

As we are parents of a person with special needs, we founded CAMP HILL AGUALINDA looking to develop the rights of people with special needs and help them find a meaningful place within our society. Therefore, we have created a space where adults with special needs can live with respect and support among a community that cares about one another.

At CAMP HILL AGUALINDA we do not have doctors or nurses, we don't have therapy sessions, we consider ourselves a group of supportive friends that rely on the help of one and another.

There is still a lot to be done, however, our model is sustainable, attainable, and replicable. It restores the rights of adults living with special needs, while providing socio-cultural exchange, social investment return, education and programs on the production of organic farming. It also includes the construction of 100% biologically sustainable housing and the production of alternative energy.

### **We are the dream social entrepreneurship of the 21<sup>st</sup> century**

CAMP HILL AGUALINDA was built with an underlying model of sustainability, created with the three independent business ideas in mind:

1. Accommodation and food: We offer partial and permanent opportunities for residence, with three full meals a day, and adequate living quarters depending on their request. These services are offered at various prices.
2. Social: We provide a daily routine for the residents which includes daily activities such as household clean up, personal hygiene, food preparation, etc. We also offer residents the opportunity to participate in the generation and make crafts for the foundation to sell, this includes organic farming. Finally, we offer support for residents that have jobs outside, by accompanying them to their jobs and aiding them in their daily tasks as needed. We perform each of the tasks above with each resident's specific needs in mind.
3. Foundation: Raises money to provide scholarships to those residents who do not have the capabilities of financing all or part of their room and board.

## CAMP HILL AGUALINDA TOKEN

1. Our Vision:

As 21st century Social Entrepreneurs, we need to be in the vanguard of new technology and opportunities. This is an ERC20 token that aims to become the preferred method to donate transparently through blockchain technology to our foundation. The online donation market is \$15bn in the US alone. The rapid adoption of cryptocurrencies will definitely impact the way to do- nate in the future

2. What is the Token for:

We are bringing more donors to Camphill Agualinda in the form of a long term Liquidity pool, and the foundation will get 2% of every transaction. In this way the donor can leave the money in the liquidity pool and recover it with a certain profit after the look up period.

3. Smart Contract :

The aim of smart contracts is to provide more security than traditional ones and reduce the [transaction costs](#). Various types of clauses can be created as partially or fully self-executing, self-enforcing, or both. Implementing smart contracts in the nonprofit sector adds a layer of security for donors, allowing the transfer of funds only if specific conditions are met.

4. Token Economy:

The crypto-economy is a new financial sector relating to the movements of money within the blockchain sector: although it emerges contextually with the development of blockchain technology in 2008, it is only in 2015, with the launch of Ethereum that the first significant developments are set in motion.

- 1% of tax fee will go to the developer.
- 1% of tax fee will go to Marketing.
- 2% To the community.
- 2% Back to liquidity.
