Over the years we were privileged to travel with Julia to great places around the world. She had an opportunity that we wish could be extended to all, to visit natural, historic and sacred wonders that have inspired humanity over thousands of years.

We saved some of Julia's cremated remains, and we intend to scatter them on travels to places that hold meaning for the world and all its people. These are sacred sites, preserved and protected for future generations.

In 2006 we spread ashes in the ocean at the ancient Mayan site, Tulum, in Mexico. We did the same in Lake Superior—made sacred by our 16 visits there on Memorial Day with Julia.

In 2007, during a trip to Europe, the three of us visited Stonehenge. As part of a special group, we were able to walk among the stones at sunset. Here, too, we scattered some of Julia's ashes.


