## Six-Wicket Mixed Doubles Organized Competition, July and August

Most of you are familiar with Golf Croquet but some of you are not familiar with Six-Wicket Croquet, which is very different. For example, in Six-Wicket, each ball must go through each wicket: in Golf Croquet each team must have a ball go through each wicket. Golf Croquet is won by the first team to win 7 wickets or if played under a time limit and no one gets 7 wickets, the team that scores the most wickets. In Six-Wicket. the winner is the first team (for example, blue and black) where each ball goes through all 12 wickets and then both balls hit the center post, which counts as the 13th wicket. If that is not done before the time limit, then the team that wins is the team that scores the most wickets. This is one reason why Six-Wicket games normally play for 2 hours and Golf croquet is played for only 1.

This tournament was a departure from recent tournaments. The games were played throughout July and August using a block play format. That is, all the

teams played every other team in the field. As a non-elimination event, the winner was determined by the total number of games won and by wicket totals, in case of ties. The teams chose their own game dates and times to avoid heat and precipitation. Each team played 5 games. The Nick and Ann Rizos team was undefeated and won the tournament. The final scorecard is on our web page.

#### Results

Three things were used to determine the winners. The number of **Wins** was the main item. **Net Wicket**, to be used for tie breakers, was the difference between wickets won and wickets lost in a game. The purpose of recording **Net Wkt** and **Wkts** was to determine winners if two or more teams won the same number of games. For this tournament, however, one team and only one team was undefeated.

First place, Nick and Ann Rizos: 5 Wins, Net Wkt 30, and Wkts 115.

Second place, Richard Watson and Dana Boots: 3 Wins, Net Wkt 3 and 75 Wkts.

Third Place, Norm and Linda Pike: 2 Wins, Net Wkt-1 and 78 Wkts.

Fourth Place, Terry Hunt and Peggy Lee: 2 Wins, Net Wkt -5 and 89 Wkts.

Fifth Place, Frank Powell and Barbara Williams: 2 Wins, Net Wkt -10 and Wkts 88 Wkts.

Sixth Place. Carl and Nancy Nicholson: 1 Win, Net Wkt -17 and 89 Wkts.

# Fall Alternate Shot Tournament, August 26

The single-elimination alternate shot format used for the tournament featured two players playing one color ball and the other two playing the other color ball. The two player pairs take turns shooting their ball. This year, 32 players entered, 8 teams of 4. The club provided refreshments, including wine and snacks for the players and the spectators who came to cheer for their friends.

Storm clouds formed in the distance during the first round of games, which determined the semifinalists, but the weather held off and the evening was pleasant. Note from Sally Bennett: After more than six years, Terry Hunt has decided to step away from junior croquet. Those of us who have worked with him know he is always there, always ready to help the juniors learn, always on task. We will miss him and hope that he stays involved somehow.

The juniors' program was Terry's brainchild. He recruited players, developed the format, and readied the court Mondays and Thursdays at 6, week after week, even when only a few players could carve time out of their schedules. He nursed the program through hot days, cold nights, rain (no snow that I can recall), windy rain, and, most importantly, Covid. During quarantine, the players truly bonded – for many, it was their only chance to see people their own age and be safe at the same time. Quarantine was a tense time, perhaps most of all for kids trying to figure out the tedious skills necessary for "remote learning." Time on the Anderson Lawn was time spent away from all of that.

Perhaps most impressive, especially knowing how intensely Terry loves the

game of croquet and playing it correctly, is that he has remained patient when these kids, who have become truly close friends, were more interested in talking to each other than in listening to him. He "took it like a man," so to speak, stoically, before finally getting them to focus. He did so much: communicated regularly with parents, planned tournaments – he even dressed as the White Rabbit, complete with pocket watch, for the "Where's Alice?" tournament. It was a day to remember. All around, we couldn't have asked for a better guy for a coach.

In the weeks to come, Wendy Hope and I hope to keep what Terry started going strong, and we will be coming to you for help, either to teach, to fill in when we can't be there, to play in tournaments, or just to share your thoughts for improvements. It's an opportunity I hope you won't pass up. You will find out that these kids require you to exercise a new mindset and I guarantee you will laugh. Honestly, the times with them are often the best part of my week. I invite you to find out for yourselves.
