(Replies to the email go to the club website and may not get to me directly.) Thanks for your help, Gloria Bensch The Tega Cay Croquet Club gets website services from GoDaddy. Our website is currently built on their platform using tools they provide. The company has improved their platform and tools and is phasing out support for the system we have been using. It may happen sometime next year. We will be forced to upgrade and rebuild the website for the new platform.

http://www.tegacaycroquet.com. This insight will help us improve the site as we rebuild it. I have listed some questions below as a guide, but if you think of anything else, feel free to add it.

As a refresher, here is a list of the information currently on the website.

- Copies of the newsletters
- Names of board members and other positions

- Photos and descriptions of recent events & tournaments of the juniors.

Here are some questions for that will help us update the website.

<u>First consider your own usage of the</u> <u>site</u>, don't speculate about what someone else would use.

- 1. How often do you go to the website? *Never* Occasionally All the time
- What information do you go to look at, see the list above? Future events? Recent events & photos? Newsletters? Other? (specific examples will help.)
- Is there anything that isn't there? Contact info for members? for the sub list? Details about upcoming events? Other? (specific examples will help.)
- 4. What is your overall impression of the site?
- 5. Is there anything that you would like to see on the Web site that is not there?
- 6. Is there anything that doesn't need to be there?

Now speculate on usage by others.

Is there anything you think other people would want or need?

George Fiegel- 14 years teaching and playing croquet. By George Fiegel

Over the next 3 months I will be moving to Michigan. I will be rejoining my wife of 23 years to live out our lives there. You may not have known everything related to our marriage, but we are happily planning for a long life together and lots of fun for many years to come. This move is not without some sadness about leaving croquet. I have enjoyed the many experiences of croquet games, parties, friendships, and and don't regret a single thing.

I will be giving up my Vice-president's position, knowing that someone will fill it and become president next year. Although played by excellent players who have many years of experience, each year the club needs good guidance so it will not fall into a mood of contentment and forget that external changes occur that require constant change and improvement.

I've taught what I have learned. I believe I play a fairly good game and I see so many people trying to get better without structure or discipline or observations that would actually lead to changes to their stance and swing and follow-through. I guess that this attitude and approach will always be there for others to follow. I have fond memories of all the people I have met, all the courts I have played, and all the wins and losses that I have had. I can remember when we played on a soccer field, without white clothes, and with other impediments to a good croquet game. We had professional croquet players come and teach croquet even though the setting was a soccer field. We had to search grassy fields next to the court for balls that were hit harder than we thought possible. We took pictures that we laugh at today because of their crudeness and our innocence. All that practice and games were played with no previous experience and no known professional guidance. Now we have good, qualified croquet experts as members of our club who can help us play better.

I can remember when we started the club without any professional or croquet experts, we sought legal advice and croquet experience. I can remember going to a lawyer to check that the by-laws were done right. Ron had the job of getting our by-laws through IRS gates. Tom Anderson was truly the mainstay and cheerleader for our new club. He knew how to cheer people on and how to sell croquet. I have included the picture because he was the true leader of the effort.

It was many years later that we branched out into other croquet vistas. The two experiences for the club and me were the trips to Hilton Head and trips to Macey White's courts in Virginia.

The trips to Hilton Head were to initiate croquet tournament between our two organizations. For a while we would travel to their site for a tournament, and they would visit with us. Besides building trophies for the winners, I made a sustaining trophy for the winning city to have. Lately, for many reasons, the competition has diminished.

Macey White has 8 courts on his property in Virginia for USCA tournaments. Although we don't attend many, this is where the experts in the US go for all levels of croquet tournaments. It gives you the opportunity to watch others play and to improve your own game. It also gives you the opportunity to play against the best in the world. Each year Macey makes his tournaments and courts more usable and attractive. You have your meals on the property, and you can meet and talk with the best in the game.

Another court of renown is found at the USCA Headquarters in Florida. A number of us took a 3-day training course in golf croquet there. I took it twice to assure myself that what I was teaching was good croquet.

The other pleasure that I've had is in building croquet trophies. I think I now have done this for 7 years. I started small, then bigger, and this year I have made trophies for the most prestigious tournaments in the nation. Trophies are about 9 inches high. I have built over 100 trophies this year, and they have been used in 4 USCA tournaments in three different cities and, of course, in our tournaments. I am happy to say that my trophies have been given to the best croquet players in the USA. I have made trophies for the younger folks in our club and for the golf game played with our sponsorship.

A set of my trophies are about 3 inches tall have been a success of sorts. Other clubs ordered those smaller trophies 50 at a time. These miniatures were also handed out at our 10-year anniversary (all 82 of them).

We also build a float for the Tega Cay July 4 parade. It was fashioned after our trophies, and it won best float that year. The wicket

on the float stretched 18 feet in the air. We had trouble on Tega Cay drive with low hanging trees.

I have ordered and distributed t-shirts with "TCCC" on them. I've probably ordered over 100 t-shirts for club members, and I own about 20 of those t-shirts. For a while we had to order 12 t-shirts at a time, but now people can go to the shop where they are printed and order one shirt at a time. I have also made earrings, with about 5 different designs. Making them requires a calm hand and a sharp eye. With the right materials anyone can make earrings. I've probably made 400 - 500 of them for croquet players all over the US and England over the last 10 years. They were sold by the USCA in Florida on consignment for a while. I can remember being stopped on croquet courts that I have visited, and people asked, "Are you the guy who makes the earrings?" I just sent out an order for 150 earrings last month. I will probably not continue making them. I also made medal badges with people's name on them. I converted them to magnet-held type when people found they rusted when they put them through a clothes washer/dryer. There were about 3 different designs. I have also made and given away scoring strings that can be hung on your belt. They are used mostly by the women in the club. The design was done by Betty Worrell.

I also carried croquet into the Tega Cay Senior Games. We included Men, Women, and Mixed tournaments where players won Senior Games medals (from the city).

I think every Tega Cay croquet player should join (or be required to join) the United States Croquet Association (USCA). There are a few benefits including knowing what is happening in the world of croquet. They also have a magazine. The USCA asked people to submit short articles pertaining to Croquet in general. Terry, Alan, and I submitted articles. One of the articles written by one of the best croquet players in the world was "It's All Practice". I consider Jeff Soo a friend and he helped better my playing and coaching. Here are some ideas he professes:

Short excerpts from his 'It's All Practice" paper:

"Practice is learning by repetition, training your body and your brain to perform an action using "muscle memory". You train yourself every time you swing a mallet. Playing easy shots well is good practice. Playing difficult shots poorly is worse than ineffectual: it is training yourself to play poorly...practice powerful swings on short shots. But that leaves a dilemma: how to practice difficult shots without practicing failure. A long shot is necessarily a more powerful shot, and players don't spend enough time practicing that swing. You train your mind every time you practice, whether or not you realize it. Actual tournament play is the best practice of all...it's all practice."

I've learned a lot about croquet, education, people interactions, and humility during my time with Tega Cay Croquet. I hope I've done the right thing and some of you take away a little of what I have taught. The game is not about me or you, it's about "did I leave the game and it's people better off?"
