The Authority is still waiting to hear if we have gotten the competitive \$700,000 grant to take care of the inflow and infiltration issues. We expect to hear this summer. Meanwhile, we continue to pay fines when there is an overflow at the Wray Pump Station. This year we paid \$2,000.00.

We are waiting to hear from PENNVEST concerning financing for the new well. We are hoping for grant money with this project also.

The sewer project is the top priority since we are paying fines and we have a deadline looming to close off the overflow pipe.

Do you remember...

Note to kids: *Read this and learn about the 'Good Ol' Days*

Former resident Leonard Stine wants to know if anyone remembers the special lunches served to schoolchildren in the basement of the Presbyterian Church during the war years.

Actually, our citizens do remember!

"Once or twice a year, they would serve us hot dogs and baked beans in the church basement, and it was delicious," Joyce Sunderland recalls.

"We walked in pairs down the walk—and we had to behave! It was a big deal. We kids looked forward to the lunches. We paid a small amount, no more than 10 or 15 cents."

Betty Kauffman remembers that the Presbyterian Women's Aid Society sponsored the lunches. "The money went towards a school cafeteria," she says.

And the kids' nickels and dimes mattered! The cafeteria opened in the

McVeytown Elementary School (now the Borough building) in 1946.

Mary Gearhart and Janet Kauffman were the cooks. For a time, they served 350 children each day. High school students ate there, too, until an addition containing the cafeteria/gynasium was built at Rothrock High School.

Though Mary and Janet were the only paid cafeteria workers, they had help from the students.

"Every fifth week, you helped in the cafeteria," Joyce remembers. Students cleared tables, scraped dishes, and took out the trash. "If you helped, you got lunch for free the entire week!"

She remembers another special day each school year. "The day before Thanksgiving, Mary and Janet served real roast turkey with all the trimmings. It was *sooo* good!"

The playground's annual summer program for children ages 5-12 starts on Tuesday, July 5. The four-week program runs Monday thru Friday, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Supervisors are Morgan Kauffman and Carley Dunmire. Registration information will be provided on the first day. Children under age five must be accompanied by an adult over 18.

The playground building is now available for event rentals. Construction of a restroom was completed in the spring 2015, and a kitchenette was added this spring. Picnic tables are available for seating and eating. Fee is \$50.

One of the three Oliver Township seats on the authority is vacant. (The other two seats are from McVeytown Borough.) If you or someone you know is interested in serving, please contact one of the authority members.

Though steady progress has been made in the past few years, we still have renovation work to accomplish at the building, ball fields and tennis and basketball courts.

The authority has not had to request additional tax revenue from the borough or the township, thanks to fundraising efforts, grant funding and the generosity of community members.

The authority meets at 6 p.m.. second Thursday of the month, at the playground building.

Our two big events each year are the spring cleanup day and the United Way Day of Caring project in fall. If you would like to volunteer with these events or have some free time to help mow or clean, please feel free to contact us.


